

### Fred Whyte Buried Here Last Week

Frederick George Whyte, 73, was buried in Greenwood Cemetery last Tuesday following funeral service in Guelph. He died in Guelph General Hospital October 18th. He had been in failing health for the past two years.

Mr. Whyte had lived in Guelph for 30 years, where he operated the Guelph Bowling Club until his retirement two years ago. Before that, he had been in business in Toronto with his brother, as the Whyte Signaling Co. He was a native of Toronto and for some years lived in New York City where he worked with a railroad.

In the mid-thirties he was well-known in sport circles as manager of the Guelph professional ball club.

Although Mr. Whyte was never a Georgetown resident, his parents lived here on Victoria Street for some time then moved to Toronto. After his mother's death, his father William Whyte married Miss Jennie Sherman of town and lived on Maple Avenue until his death a few years ago.

He is survived by his wife, the former Edith Gartley of Georgetown, and one son Gartley Whyte, Guelph. A daughter Mrs. Florence Smiley of Kitchener died ten years ago and a son Flying Officer William Whyte was killed overseas in World War II. A brother John of Toronto, and sister Mrs. Arthur Blight, Toronto, also survive.

Rev. A. A. Barker conducted a graveside service, with friends attending from Kingston, Belleville, Toronto, Kitchener, Barrie and Georgetown.

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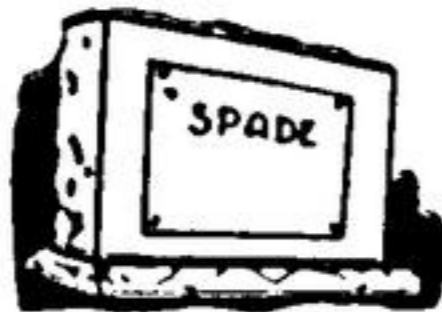

Mrs. T. Thompson of Toronto was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Ern Bickin last week.

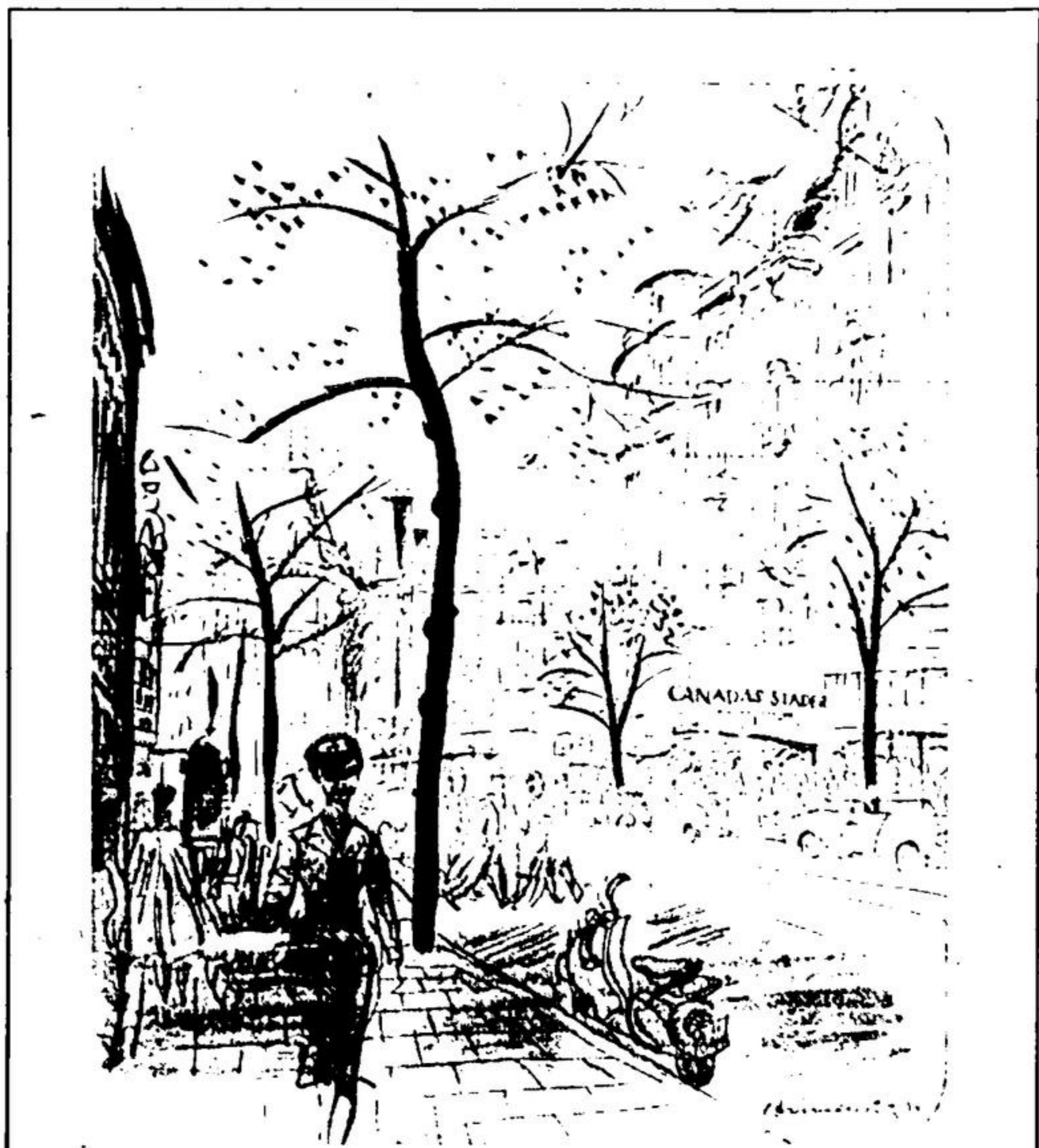
Friends and acquaintances of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Miller are pleased to have them back in their midst after a nine week vacation with friends

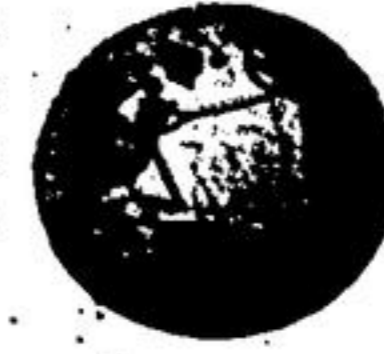
## They're talking about Canada the world over
