#### FARM NEWS

### Howden, Cunningham Plow at International

Twelve Halton Juniors, all 17 years and under, participated in the Halton Juniors' Plowing Match for boys and girls under 21 years, held at the farm of Thomas Howden, near Hornby. The event was jointly sponsored by the Halton Juniors and the Halton Plowmen's Association. Twelve excellent ridges were turned and all contestants were highly recommended by Winfred Timbers, veteran plowman and judge, who was the official coach and judge of the day.

The awards were as follows:  
CLASS 1 — Boys or Girls, 16 years and under: Marilyn May, Milton R. R. 4; Martha May, Hornby R. R. 2;

CLASS 2: Tractor Mounted Plows, Mary Lou Taylor, Hornby; Burt Speck, Hornby R. R. 2; Richard Sheppard, Milton R. R. 2.

CLASS 3: Boys and Girls under 21 years — Arnold Howden, Milton R. R. 4, Score 79.3; John Cunningham, Hornby, score 79.

CLASS 4 — Inter-Secondary School Competition — Ross Austin and Tommy Hunter, representing North Halton High School Area score 149.1; 2, Glen Irwin and Bill Speck, representing Oakville — Trafalgar High School Area, Score 147.4; 3, Burlington-Nelson High School area. In this latter case, Don Taylor, who placed fourth in the individual standing, was without a team mate.

Arnold Howden and John Cunningham will represent Halton in the inter-county competition at the International Plowing Match to be held near Breslau. Rumour has it that Oakville-Trafalgar High School will be represented in the Inter-Secondary School Competition with tractors, on Thursday, October 14th by Glen Irwin and Wm. Speck. There is also a strong possibility that North Halton High School Area Board will send their representatives, Ross Austin and Tommy Hunter, for the same competition.
