Fourteen Institutes and Junior Institutes exhibited in the non-competitive display and their ideas for modern living were well worth viewing. Seven girls entered garden displays.

The largest sheep and hog show in the history of the fair took place. A total of 72 hogs were entered in the special bacon hog class sponsored by the Society and the T. Eaton Co., and these were bought at a good figure and shipped to Toronto to be graded and judged on the rail.

Sheep exhibitors came from far and near and included: Cyrus E. Loudon, Smithville, Hampshire; Emke Bros., Elmwood and J. A. Kelly, Elora, Long Wool; Emerson Loudon, Glanford Station, and Emke Bros., Southdowns, Emke Bros. and Kelly, Shropshire, T. J. Clarkson, Weston, and Frank Mack Hillsburg, Suffolk Down, in the any other down class were Harbour Bros., Hillsburg, and Emke Bros. Best pen of fine wool sheep went to Clarkson, Mack, Loudon and Emke, market lambs to Kelly, best Shropshire to Emke and Kelly, and best pen Southdowns to Emerson Loudon and Emke, George Wheeler of Orton was the only exhibitor in the regular swine classes.

J. A.
