Austrian Art Display At Library This Week

An unusual opportunity will be offered residents of this area on Friday and Saturday when an exhibition of paintings by Austrian artists will be on view at Georgetown Public Library.

The exhibition, arranged by the Economic Association of Graphic and Plaster Artists of Austria is under the direction of Major Leslie Matyssovsky, who is manager of the Continental Art Gallery.

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in the proper direction so that he does not become bogged down in detail. A small, efficient office staff of three handles company bookkeeping. He relies on his lawyer and accountants to handle the complicated financial aspect of business. His brother is salesman for the companies.
