WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Call Tenders for
Highway Resurfacing**

Tenders have been called for resurfacing No. 7 Highway through town from Durham Street to the "White Bridge."

This portion of the highway, which it is the town's responsibility to maintain, has been in bad condition for several years, and Cr. McGilvray has been a strong proponent of getting it at work this year, while Mayor Armstrong and some other council members have urged that storm drains, catch basins and other improvements be made at the same time as a protective measure for the new surface.

At last week's council meeting, it was decided to call for tenders for the complete job, which will also include asphalt coating from the travelled portion of the road to the sides. Tenders are to be opened at next Monday's meeting.

John Gunn, Chamber of Commerce president, asked that council consider providing lighting for the new downtown parking lot, and the matter was turned over to the parkery committee.

Charles Wray, head of the retail section of the chamber asked council to continue their Christmas lighting plan and buy two more strings of coloured lights for Main St. This will be done, and Mr. Wray who also spoke for a group of Mill Street merchants was given permission to string lights in the theatre area which will be paid for by merchants themselves.

A \$50 gratuity was passed to provide dinner for assessment officers who will meet in Georgetown later this month.

Questioning the mayor on charges made for transformers for industrial plants, Reeve Allen was told that the hydro commission had ruled that 15 K.V.A. had been set by the commission as the point at

which a charge is made for this service.

A \$5 request from Roy Baker for cleaning out a town drain through his property caused some comment. Reeve Allen thought Mr. Baker should be paid, but the mayor and others said this would set a precedent and they could not condone having property owners do unauthorized work and ask payment for it.

Tenders for 5 per cent debentures, totalling \$192,000 were called for October 18th. \$33,000 of this issue is for direct town expenses, while the balance, including \$111,000 for hydro conversion is to be returned to the town over the debenture period. \$63,500 for a public school addition is one of the major items in the issue. Third reading was given to by-laws for sidewalks on Sarah Street and sewers on Hy-ton and Edward Streets, with debentures to be issued later.

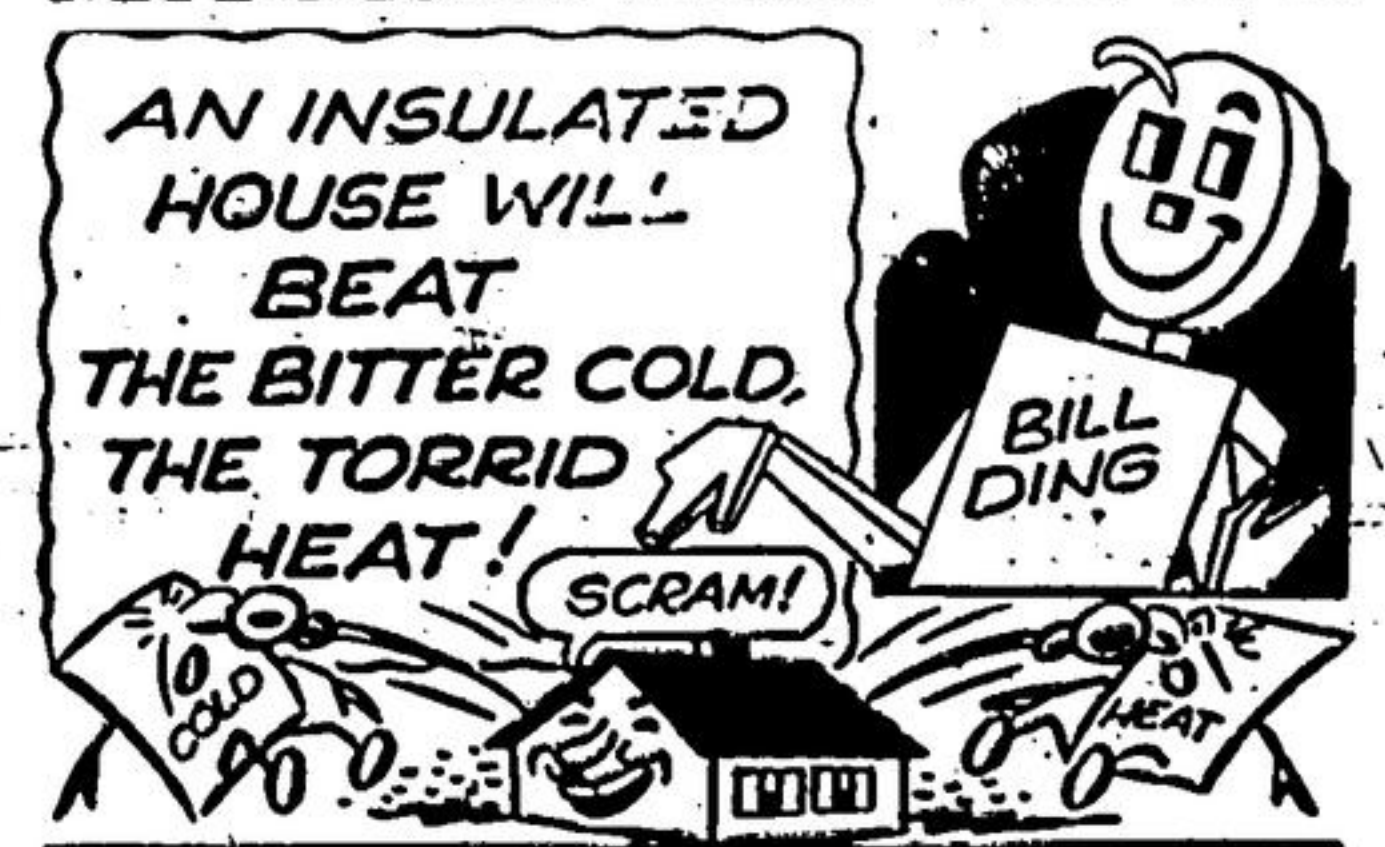
