

Martin Treanor Was Prominent Presbyterian

Funeral service was conducted in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Streetsville, for one of Toronto Township's highly respected citizens, Martin Treanor. Mr. Treanor, who had been ill only a week, had suffered a coronary and died October 7th. Born in Toronto to Township, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Treanor, he spent his entire life in the district.

One of St. Andrew's oldest members Mr. Treanor, whose church and home filled his life, had joined the congregation 55 years ago. He served on the Board of Managers and later was ordained an elder and

made an honorary member of the Board of Managers, an office he held until his death.

Besides his wife he is survived by two daughters, Wilhelmine (Mrs. Ross Brown), Norval, and Allison (Mrs. Bruce Nixon) Streetsville and one son, Alan, at home, and six grandchildren. Four sisters and two brothers also survive, Mrs. Horace Deeth, Erin; Mrs. Harvey Cook, Cooksville; Mrs. Wilmer Maddill, Meadowdale; Mrs. Hattie Taggart, Toronto; Jesse Treanor and Stephen Treanor, Cooksville.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. Herbison assisted by Dr. W. T. McCree, a former minister of St. Andrew's, and a friend of the family. Interment was in Streetsville Cemetery. Pallbearers were John Weylie, Alan Couss, S. E. Wolfe, Christopher Crozier, R. Kahler and C. Belleghem.
