Hans Grabner, who works entirely with a palette knife, had a number of brilhant forceful canvasses showing the vastness and scintillating beauty of the Alps, while Karl Uvkovic had four small delightful impressions of the same mountains that were more subdued in tone and fanciful in

style. There was a farmyard scene by F J. Schenk, who is well-known dor his detail. So much so that one could imagine the sounds and movements of the life depicted within the frame.
