Hydro Conversion Begins Crews at Work in Town

Ontario Hydro crews moved into Georgetown last week to start the complex 25 to 60-cycle "Operation Changeover" in the town.

Hydro Chairman Robert H. Saunders said the switch to 60 cycles for the 1,340 domestic, 185 commercial, and 32 power customers in Georgetown will be carried out in a series of weekday "cuts" over the period of November 3. The conversion is under way in the north-east section of the town, and will move generally west and south from there.

Two of the town's major industries—the mills of Alliance Paper and Provincial Paper, Ltd.—have already been changed over in advance to operate on 60-cycle power, and conversion is under way at another, the main plant of Smith & Stone Co.

Many Home Items

In Georgetown homes, it is estimated that Hydro crews will have to convert some 1,100 washing machines, 780 refrigerators, and 500 record players. In addition, some 1,000 clocks and fans will either be altered or exchanged for new models.

In addition, thousands of other items will be altered in stores, offices, factories and other premises. High numerically on Hydro lists are fluorescent light units, which will lose their 25-cycle "flicker" when the switch is made to 60 cycles.

Ontario Hydro's A. W. Manby Service Centre in Islington will serve as base for changeover work in the Georgetown area. The postal address of the Frequency Standardization office at this Centre is P.O. Box 370, Postal Station "S", Toronto 18.

For service and information, customers in the area are asked to call TRiangle 7-2239, and their calls will be promptly routed through on a direct line to the changeover office in Islington. Through radio contact with well-equipped conversion trucks right in the "cut over" sections, Hydro will be able to provide fast and efficient servicing of customers' equipment.

Co-operation Important

Mr. Saunders said customer co-operation plays a big part in the smooth functioning of changeover. Most important to Hydro is that some responsible person be home to admit technicians on "cut" day. If a home is found unoccupied, Hydro is forced to cut off the power supply in order to prevent possible damage to customers' connected 25-cycle appliances when the 60-cycle frequency is switched on.

"Changeover Day" for the customer gets under way early in the morning, when Ontario Hydro technicians visit all homes and business premises in the district being standardized, and ensure that all frequency sensitive appliances are disconnected.

Work is then begun on the actual alteration of these appliances, and by 10 a.m., when the power in the street lines is switched from 25 to 60 cycles, the technicians will generally have already made the changeover on smaller items such as record players.

The 10 a.m. switch in the street

lines involves only a brief interruption in power service to the home. The 25-cycle power is disconnected and within 30 minutes—sometimes less than a minute—the new 60-cycle current is switched on for the first time, and goes into the house at this higher frequency.

This means that except during the brief cut-off period, the customer can make normal use throughout the day of the lights and of all other equipment not affected by the change in frequency—such as stoves without timing devices, toasters, and so on.

All in One Day

Generally, all frequency-sensitive equipment in the home will have been converted to 60 cycles within the one day. Most equipment, too, is altered right on the premises.

In certain cases, however, some types of appliances must be removed to Hydro's standardization workshops. Where this may cause inconvenience, Hydro makes every effort to supply a replacement unit on loan while that of the customer is at the workshop.

Storm Spells Doom For Old Feed Mill

The great storm of this week, though creating considerably less havoc than in the Toronto area, nevertheless left its mark on the river bed in Norval.

The quickly flowing millrace was quite unrecognizable in the early hours of Saturday morning. In its place was a turbulent torrent which had torn away the parking lot behind the old mill, creating a new path for the Credit at this point.

The field between the millrace and the river proper was a seething mass of water, littered with broken trees and debris brought down by the rushing water. On Sunday the water level had fallen considerably but the impact of the storm on the mill itself was then more noticeable.

One corner of the brickwork at the base had been washed away and it is probable that the whole structure has been finally undermined. No damage was done to the goods stored there but it is probable that the old mill has seen the last of the auction sales held there the past month or two by Mr. Pallott.

In spite of its dangerous proximity to the flooded river, the premises of the new Plastonics Limited (former plant of Lindner-Gurd) were undamaged. Strangely enough the bridge, recently hit by a heavy truck, is still standing, in spite of its precarious hold. As in most villages in the district, the majority of basements were flooded and on Saturday morning sump pumps were definitely at a premium.

This Saturday in Norval, scouts will be holding their annual Apple Day.

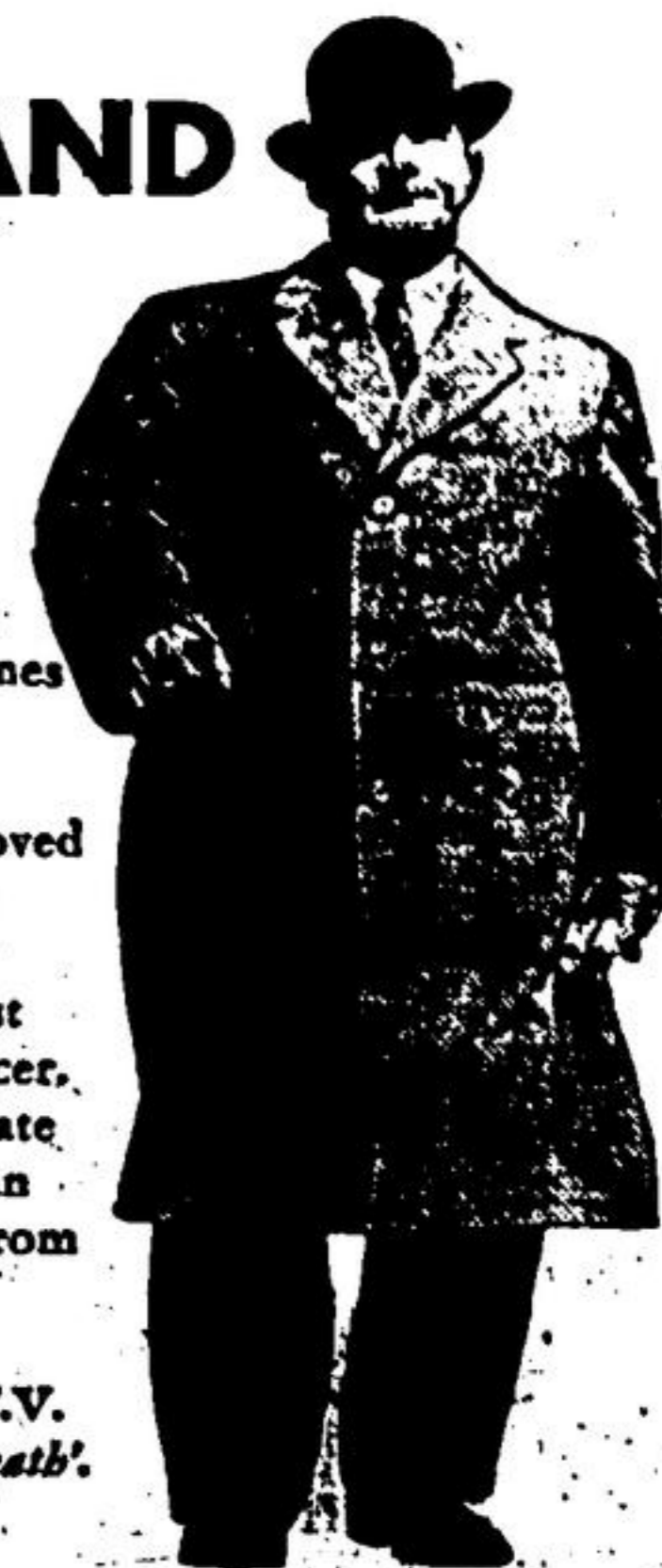
