## Women's Council Gives To Hurricane Relief

At the October meeting of the Local Council of Women held at the home of Mrs. F. W. Johnson, Edith St. on Friday, \$37.00 was voted to the Hurricane Relief Fund. Mrs. J. W. Kerr presided.

Excerpts from reports of Provincial Council conveners of standing committees:

**Arts and Letters:** The Provincial Council (through the National Council) presented the Dominion Government with a resolution asking that the Report of the Royal Commission on Arts, Letters and Sciences be implemented by the appointment of a chairman of a Council of Fine Arts. A resolution was also presented to the Provincial Government asking that an Arts Council for Ontario be set up.

**Cinema (films) and Printed Matter:** Press releases during the past few months have shown that comics are still very much in the news. A fully documented study of the influence of crime comics "Seduction of the Innocent" by Frederic Wertham, M.D. is the answer to those who "yoo-hoo," the claim that no bad or lasting influence exists in crime comics.

Provincial Council also passed a resolution objecting to the advertising releases of some moving pictures. The new Theatres Act of 1953 gives the Ontario Board of Censors greater authority in such matters.

**Citizenship:** Most of the L. C. W's reported on the help being given in their communities to help the new Canadians fit into our economy.

**Economics:** A greater study of 'Trade' was urged, especially imports and exports.

**Public Health:** "The health of a country is one of its greatest assets." All over the province mental patients outnumber all other illnesses. Communicable diseases are being very satisfactorily controlled. The Ontario Government granted \$6,300,000 to cancer research in 1953.

**United Nations and International Affairs:** "The United Nations is the greatest effort in all history to preserve peace." United Nations Day October 24th. Members were urged to study this work.

**Welfare:** Since 'working mothers' seem to have become the order of the day, Day Nurseries have become more important. All day nurseries are subject to inspection and licensing under the provisions of the Day Nurseries Act. \$5.00 was donated to the Poppy Fund.

Several members plan to hear the National President, Mrs. Turner Bone of Montreal when she visits the Hamilton and Toronto Councils early in November.
