BRAMPTON DRAMATIC TREAT "SAINT JOAN" NEXT WEEK

"Saint Joan" Canadian Players platform version of the George Bernard Shaw play will be at the Brampton Odeon next Wednesday and Thursday. The company plays in 23 Ontario centres before opening a U.S. tour in Detroit in February.

Composed of a seven member group of top calibre actors, most of them are familiar to Canadian audiences as radio personalities and as members of the Stratford Shakespearean productions.

Douglas Campbell, who appeared with Alex Guinness in All's Well that Ends Well in 1953 and with James Mason this season in Measure for Measure, is director and plays two roles in Saint Joan.

Small Utility Room Creates Difficult Storage Problems

Most utility rooms are too small. A utility room should be at least 100 square feet of space in order to accommodate the necessary equipment and to provide enough space for working.

Many utility rooms are used for the storage of screens and storm-windows, children's playthings, garden tools and other articles as well as housing the house heating boiler, water heater, and laundry equipment.

Owners invariably find that the demands for storage space increase with the number of years that a house has been occupied. A small crowded utility room is a serious disadvantage.

Utility rooms that are too small also create a problem in connection with laundry equipment. Despite the advent of automatic washers, laundry trays still have many uses. If the utility room is too small, there is usually not enough room for a two-compartment laundry tray.

A two-compartment laundry tray is a great convenience because one compartment is available for rinsing or for bluing clothes while the other compartment can be used at the same time for soaking clothes or handling them in some other manner.

Texas City Explosive Gains Favor as Able Fertilizer

Ammonium nitrate, the Dr. Jekyll-Mr. Hyde compound which figured in the disastrous Texas City explosion a few years ago, is rapidly gaining favor as a fertilizer and may become the preferred material for direct application to the soil. Dr. R. C. Tallman of the Lion Oil Company, El Dorado, Ark., told the American Chemical Society. The compound is employed in both explosives and fertilizers.

Although its plant-food properties had long been known, ammonium nitrate had been used before 1943 only in solutions for the preparation of mixed fertilizers, according to Dr. Tallman, who is manager of planning and survey in Lion's research division. Some ammonium nitrate was released from government plants for fertilizer use in 1943, however, and since then the compound has enjoyed a meteoric rise to prominence as a fertilizer material, he said.

Due to its comparatively high nitrogen content, its wide adaptability to soil and climatic conditions, its comparative resistance to leaching and, probably of greatest importance, its low cost per unit of nitrogen, Dr. Tallman stated, "It is those who feel that ammonium nitrate will eventually be the nearly universal fertilizer for direct application."

Heart Condition Cure

A serious heart condition, caused by tuberculous inflammation of the membrane which surrounds the heart, is being cured by two San Francisco doctors through surgical removal of the diseased membrane. Pericardiectomy—as the removal of this membrane is called—was performed on four patients suffering from the tuberculous pericarditis. The doctors report three of the patients are cured and the fourth shows progressive improvement. The Journal of the American Medical Association carries this report by Drs. Emile Holman and Forrest Willet of the Stanford University School of Medicine and the San Francisco Veterans Administration Hospital. The mortality rate from tuberculous pericarditis has been high, the doctors said. Tuberculosis germs attacking the membrane around the heart cause it to become thickened and inflamed, putting pressure on the heart. Patients become increasingly disabled by cardiac compression. In the past, patients have been treated by prolonged bed rest.

Consumer Economy

Thanks to one of the greatest production records in the nation's history, the consumer sector of the economy is currently better prepared than at any time within the past decade to meet the austere demands of the rearmament program, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce. As illustrations, the Commerce Department gave the following selected production achievements between 1946 and 1950: close to 5 million new non-farm dwelling units; almost 21 million new passenger automobiles; 21 million electric refrigerators; 75 million radio sets; 12 million television sets; over 17 million washing machines; and 18 million electric and gas ranges. As a result, per family holdings of major durable goods are currently at a record high, it is estimated.

The Wet Spot


The apparent wet spot on highways is a form of mirage, like those that appear in desert regions. The road, especially if dark in color, absorbs energy from the Sun's rays and becomes quite hot, so there is a layer of heated air just above. Rays of light from the sky, coming at a low angle and which would normally be absorbed by the dark surface of the road, are bent upward by this heated air layer, and they reach your eyes. This is similar to the familiar effect of light being reflected from a wet spot on the road, and that is the interpretation we give at first to what we see.
