Two Bridges Lost, One Is Damaged, But Halton Damage Light

The aftermath of Hurricane Hazel in Halton was described in damaged bridges, washouts, and flooded farm lands, during the regular monthly session of Halton County Council in Milton last week.

Reeve Wilfrid Bird, Esq., chairman of the county road committee, related the damages caused to county roads. Two bridges were totally lost, one a temporary structure, a third received considerable damage. While no estimate of damage caused to township roads was immediately available, the following damages were reported by county engineer Roy F. Smith.

Bridge destroyed on the Base Line, east of the 8th line, replacement cost \$6,000; 36 foot steel truss bridge on the Town Line, Nelson-Trafalgar, abutment damaged, causing the road to be closed, repairs estimated at \$2,000, approach to the Drumquin Bridge partially washed out, repairs completed here, 7th line bridge north of Drumquin, shoulders washed out and repairs mostly completed, quite a number of small wash-outs reported on other county roads, these repairs will be completed this week; work at the Lowville bridge is delayed until the water level recedes, a temporary bridge was lost, replacement cost \$300, other damages reported to the 8th line bridge with washouts on the shoulders of the 8th line north of the tracks. repairs are being made as rapidly as possible.

Members of council stated the county was very fortunate that more damage did not occur in the county. Following discussion, council unanimously endorsed a resolution providing \$1,000 for the Hurricane Relief Fund.

FARM NEWS

MINNESOTA U. PROF. LIVESTOCK SPEAKER

The Memorial Hall at the Ontario Agricultural College was the scene of the annual McGillivray lecture today in conjunction with the Livestock Conference. Dr. W. E. Peterson of the University of Minnesota, was this year's special speaker, and his subject "Dairying Tomorrow."

Dr. Peterson is an internationally recognized authority on the subject dairying and his address was of interest to every person engaged in milk production.

Two other addresses which featured the day's programme were those of Dr. E. W. Crampton of Macdonald College, Que., who spoke on Swine Nutrition; and that of Dr. G. A. Branaman, of Mich. State College, who discussed "The Place of Roughages in Beef Cattle Production."

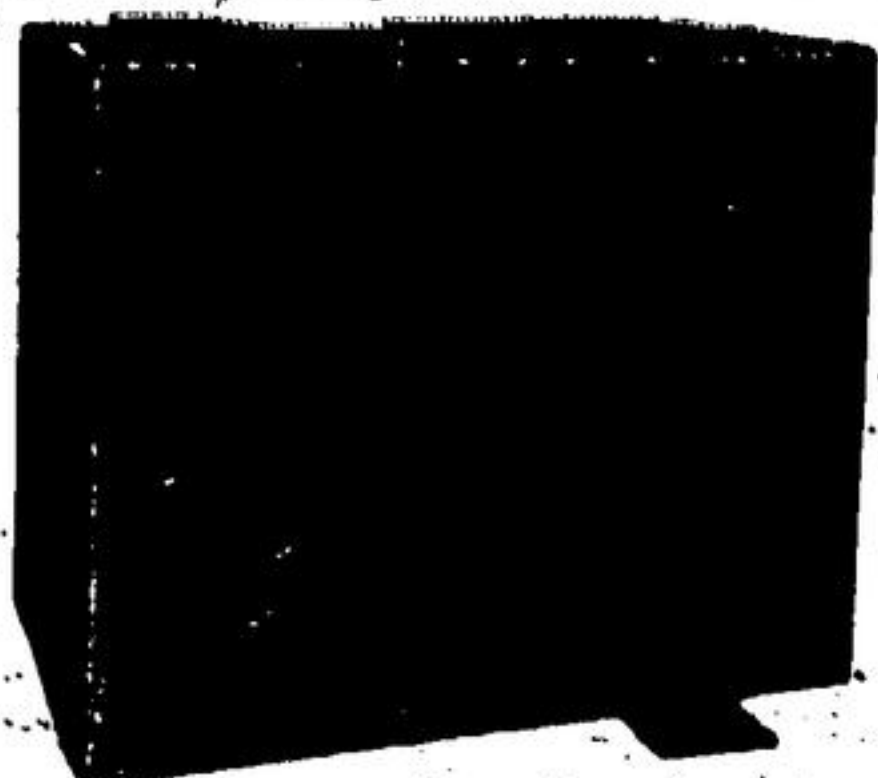
