Oakville-Trafalgar Hospital Cited Best Public Relations

Hospital Management has announced that Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital has been awarded the Malcolm T. MacEachern Citation, a heavy bronze plaque, for having the best public relations entry among hospitals of 200 beds or less in the magazine's annual competition.

In advising of the award, Frank Hicks, Editor of Hospital Management, stated that there were never so many public relations contest entries as this year, never was the quality of entries so high, and that the judging was of an unusually high order.

"We like to think of this competition as something more than just a competition," stated Mr. Hicks. "The entries are permanent records of what the hospitals have done during the year in the field of public relations."

Great credit is due to the very active Board of Governors of Oakville-Trafalgar which, ever since the hospital was opened three years ago, has been very conscious of good public relations. Specific credit, however, belongs to Mr. Sydney N. Lambert who is the hospital's voluntary public relations consultant.

Mr. Lambert, whose regular occupation is that of Manager of Public Relations for the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company of Canada Ltd. (a sufficiently busy task for any person), has given unselfishly, or rather, enthusiastically, of his time to keep the hospital's story prominent in the minds of the people of Oakville. Activities have been broad in their range and included staff relations policies, general publicity in newspapers, radio and television, dramatic presentation of the Annual Report, community participation by personal and business memberships in the Oakville-Trafalgar Hospital Association, speakers' bureau, memorial fund and several other very effective mediums.

Mr. Hicks reminds that all hospitals have public relations whether they plan them or not, and it stands to reason that a planned public relations programme is more important than an unplanned one. An annual compilation of work done helps in planning next year's public relations job.
