### Consider By-law Revision When Houses Too Close

Revision of Georgetown's building by-law was forecast at Monday's council meeting, with Reeve Stan Allen put in charge of suggesting any changes.

It was learned that several houses in Cloverdale Heights have contravened the present by-law calling for houses to be 5 feet from the side lot line. The same thing applies at Sunbeam Heights, according to George Hewson, who spoke for that company. Lawyer Mr. McPhedran represented the Glatt Construction firm which is building Cloverdale.

The houses in question are only 4 ft. from the lot boundaries, which Mr. Hewson claims is the custom in

most neighbouring towns, and suits NHA building requirements. He suggested the local by-law be reduced to this amount.

As building inspector George Adams had issued permits for the houses constructed, council felt no blame could be attached to contractors and waived any infractions which had been unknowingly made.

Visiting council as spectators, a group of members of St. George's AYPA, were told by the mayor how council functions, and committee duties were explained briefly.

Resignation of W. G. Bell because of ill health, from the Board of Parks, made the second such resignation in a week. Veteran J. J. Gibbons resigned recently also for the same reason.

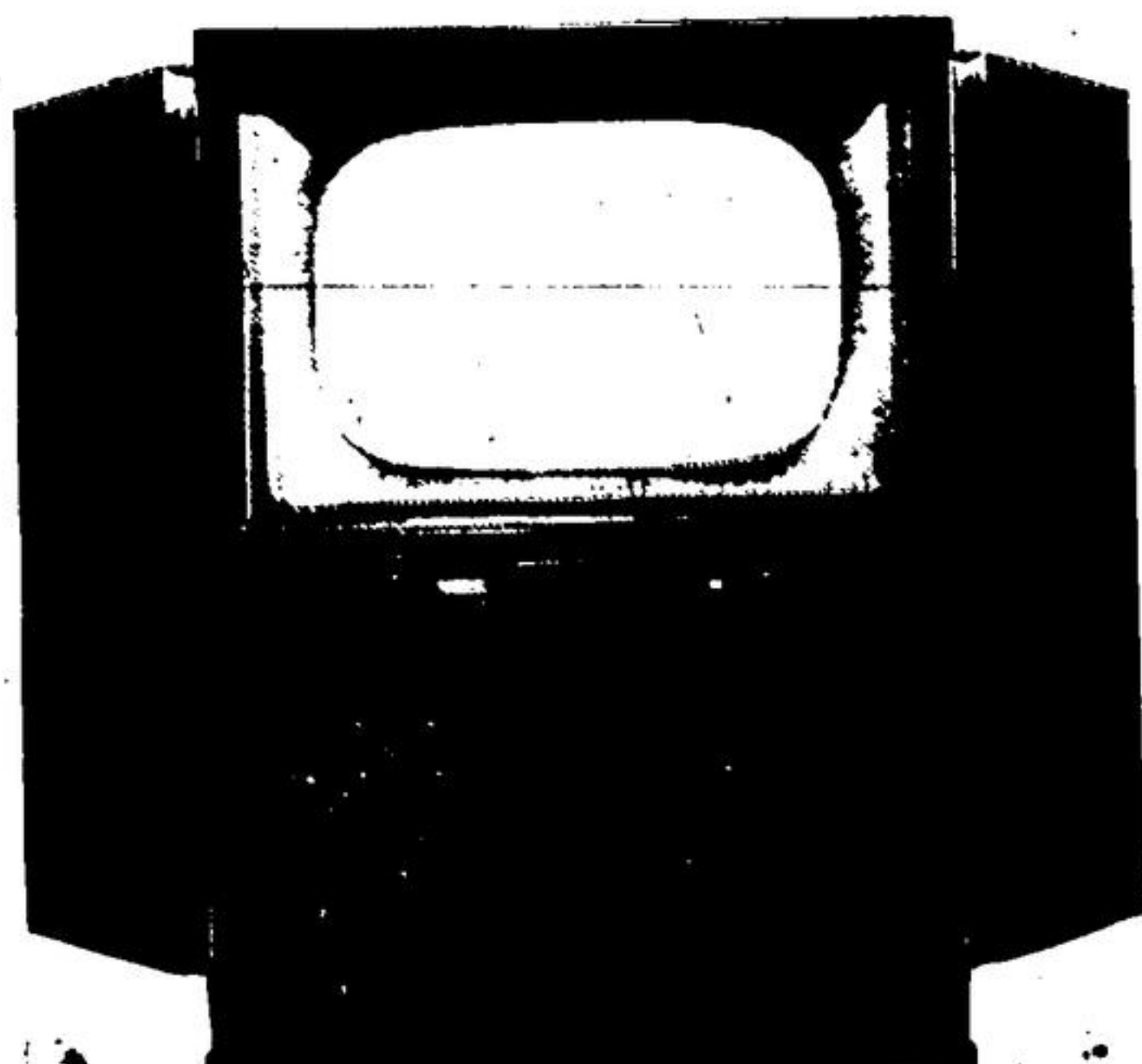
