Church Men Banquet and Hear Padre W. A. Young

Monday, the annual men's banquet of the Presbyterian Church was held in the church basement. Rev. G. L. Royal presided and Rev. W. A. Young, OAC padre was the guest speaker.

His main theme was a comparison between the soil and the soul of man. He spoke with emphasis of the land-hungry peoples of the world and made a comparison between the acreage per head of population in these lands and ours. Over-population and shortage of land he considers one of the main causes of war, citing the German need for "lebensraum" before the last war as an example. Hunger and misery caused by it opens the door to communist propaganda the world over.

He said we must view with misgiving the spreading menace of industrialization in Ontario and emphasized the responsible role of the farmer in checking this. Man's life, he concluded, is like the soil. We get out of it what we put in. Nelson Robinson thanked the W.A. ladies for catering for the 45 men present.

Last Tuesday the annual thank-offering meeting of the Presbyterian WMS was held in the church. Guests were present from Union, Norval United, Georgetown and Brantford Presbyterian churches. The church was decorated with pink and white baby mums. President Mrs. Harold McClure was in charge and devotions were offered by Mrs. Bruce and a prayer by Mrs. Julian, both of Brampton.

Mrs. Clark Lyons sang two solos with Mrs. Oliver Hunter at the organ. Roll call of the various auxiliaries was taken by the secretary Mrs. Harold Reed.

Speaker was Mrs. Ralston, principal of the Presbyterian deaconess training home in Toronto. She spoke on vocations, stressing that each has a part in God's plan, and dwelt on

the struggles of the early church, with special mention of the work of Stephen and Phillip.

There is a challenge today, she said, to go and preach the gospel to those who have not heard "in language they understand. She mentioned a new movement, in Europe to bring christianity into industry, by sending chaplains into factories.

She then spoke of the early days of the Ewart Training Home, founded in 1897, and its gradual expansion. She indicated the kind of training girls receive and the vocations they adopt when they leave, some going overseas, some working as regional secretaries and others as congregational deaconesses. In 1940 members had fallen to the discouraging total of 4, but now there are 27. There is need for more and more trained workers.

A dedicatory prayer by Mrs. W. Reed followed the offering, and after a hymn and courtesies made by Mrs. J. V. McClure, lunch was served by the committee, Mrs. P. Leslie and Mrs. S. McClure.

Hallowe'en festivities were opened in the village by the party of scouts and guides, cubs and brownies in the Anglican hall Friday.
