**Child Experts Warn Parents  
About Threatening Offspring**

Never use the warning of medicine or the doctor, as a threat to children, warns Childcraft guidance experts.

Such threats are generally used in moments of stress when over-tired and impatient parents want Junior to obey, or stop misbehaving immediately. But grownups don't realize how much future trouble they are storing up for themselves, the child and the doctor or nurse.

When the child really needs the doctor—for anything from a check-up to hospitalization—he is going to associate the physician with punishment for being bad. Like any fearful or resentful person, he is going to try to avoid the terrible stranger's touch by crying and struggling. Doctor will not be his usual sympathetic self for long, and mother will find herself in the middle of chaos!

Instead, discussing the doctor in terms of a friend and helper, will help the child to achieve a basic co-operative attitude—which he will need to help both himself and the doctor, when the time for medical aid arrives.

**Blood Transfusions Start  
Saving of U.S. Farm Life**

Blood transfusions, now saving countless human lives, also are being used today to save lives of thousands of farm animals and pets, the American Veterinary Medical Association reports.

Animal ailments being treated successfully with blood transfusions include shipping fever, infectious calf scours, jaundice in foals, sweet clover poisoning, anaplasmosis, leptospirosis, and distemper. Veterinarians also give transfusions of whole blood to pets and livestock suffering severe hemorrhage as the result of injuries or surgery.

The blood donor must be a healthy animal, free of contagious or infectious disease. It should be full-grown and not too old. In large animals, those which are three to six years of age make the best donors. Among small animals, donors from one and one-half to five years of age are preferred.

The veterinary medical association explained that as a rule, a blood donor which has recovered from the illness for which the patient is being treated, is the best choice. In dairy cattle, a two or three year old animal which has gone through a seige of shipping fever and pneumonia is preferred.

**Skin Disease**

Many cases of inflammation of the skin (dermatitis) affecting the feet and other parts of the body can be blamed on synthetic resins used in the partial linings of shoes and other manufactured items, according to a Buffalo dermatologist.

Dr. James W. Jordan points out the many instances of dermatitis on the feet and body traced to synthetic resins and their components "make it evident" that these substances are important skin sensitizing agents. Dr. Jordan is associated with the Department of Dermatology and Syphilology, University of Buffalo School of Medicine. "Contact with these substances is almost universal," said Dr. Jordan, pointing out that they are widely used in wood finishes, furniture upholstery material, varnishes and lacquers, steering wheels, handles, musical instruments, toys, games, sporting goods, wearing apparel, accessories and jewelry. Cases of dermatitis due to direct contact with hair lacquer pads, spectacle frames, garters and wrist watch bands containing these substances are known, said Dr. Jordan, adding: "It is evident that many obscure cases of dermatitis, in which no clearcut history of contact (with resins) is elicited, may be due to these compounds."

**French Guiana**

French Guiana's interior, draped in jungle vapor and unexplored mountains between Brazil to the south and Surinam to the west, is still one of the wildest spots left on earth. Descendants of escaped African slaves carry on ancestral rites of fetishism and, some explorers believe, human sacrifice. Head hunters roam the rain forests. But there is also gold in the heart of French Guiana, as Sir Walter Raleigh suspected in his search for Eldorado. Small placer operations, many worked by onetime convicts, exploit jungle streams today. Vast stands of rare hardwoods, fertile soil and untouched mineral deposits contribute to the colony's untapped wealth.
