### Agincourt Plowmen Tops Halton Open Jointers

Despite unfavorable weather conditions the 1954 annual match held by the Halton Plowmen's Association on the farm of Geo. Brownridge, at Omagh, on Friday can be considered an outstanding success. While early morning showers curtailed some entries and also resulted in a below normal machinery show, some excellent ridges were turned. The official judges, George Hostrawser and Alex Black, both former provincial champions, congratulated the contestants on the quality of work done, and the Association on their smooth running match.

Herb Jarvis, recently crowned provincial walking plow champion, demonstrated why he is provincial champion by taking the top award in the open jointer plow class.

A highlight was to see the eight Halton young people out in the class for those under 16 years. Here Glen Irwin was the champion. The George E. Elliott Specials for the youngest plowmen were won by Mary Lou Taylor, of Burlington and Ian Break of the Hornby district. Both are 13 years of age. The Bank of Nova Scotia Special, for the high Halton contestant in the open tractor class for those under 21 years, went to John Cunningham of Hornby. In fact most of the specials went to plowmen from Hornby district—with Stanley May having the best ridge in walking plows by a Halton contestant—Keith Merry the best ridge with tractor drawn plows by a Halton contestant—and Tommy Hunter took the Bank of Commerce Special for the best ridge in Class 4 by a Halton contestant.

### Elliott Special Speaker

In the absence of Hon. F. S. Thomas, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, who had been announced as the guest speaker, George E. Elliott, Milton lawyer, took on the task. He delighted the crowd of 217 who attended the banquet, held in Trafalgar Memorial Hall, with his able and thought-provoking address entitled "It is all in your mind."

Others who spoke briefly during the excellent programme included Warden J. J. Stewart, Reeve Emerson Ford, Sybil Bennett, M.P. and Stanley Hall, M.P.P. who as Halton's representative on the Ontario Plowmen's Association, presented the O.P.A. Trophy to Halton's winning inter-county plow team at the International, John Cunningham and Arnold Howden; Ted Lucas manager of the Royal Bank, Burlington, who presented the Royal Bank special won by Arnold Howden at the International; Ken Reid, district manager for the International Harvester Co., who presented his company's special offer at the International and won by J. H. Taylor of the Appleby Line.

### Inter-County Champs

In recognition of the achievement of John Cunningham and Arnold Howden in winning the inter-county event at the International, the Halton Association presented the two young men each with a gladstone bag. This feature of the programme was handled by Victor Hall, veteran director of the Halton Board, assisted by Harold Pickett and Willard Featherstone, two of the members of Halton's previous winning inter-county team in 1933.

Mildred Johnston, Esqueping Township's talented young dancer, contributed some numbers to round out the programme presided over by Spencer Wilson, president of Halton association. As indicated by president Wilson, the Halton Association was most fortunate in having as their hosts, Mr. and Mrs. George Brownridge whose hospitality more than compensated for the weeping skies and chill breezes. The ladies of the Omagh Presbyterian W.A.; and of Bethel W.A. did an outstanding job of satisfying the inner man at noon and evening respectively. Mr. Wilson also said the Halton association is fortunate in having the support of a long list of individuals and commercial organizations, whose generosity makes it possible for the association to offer an outstanding prize list.

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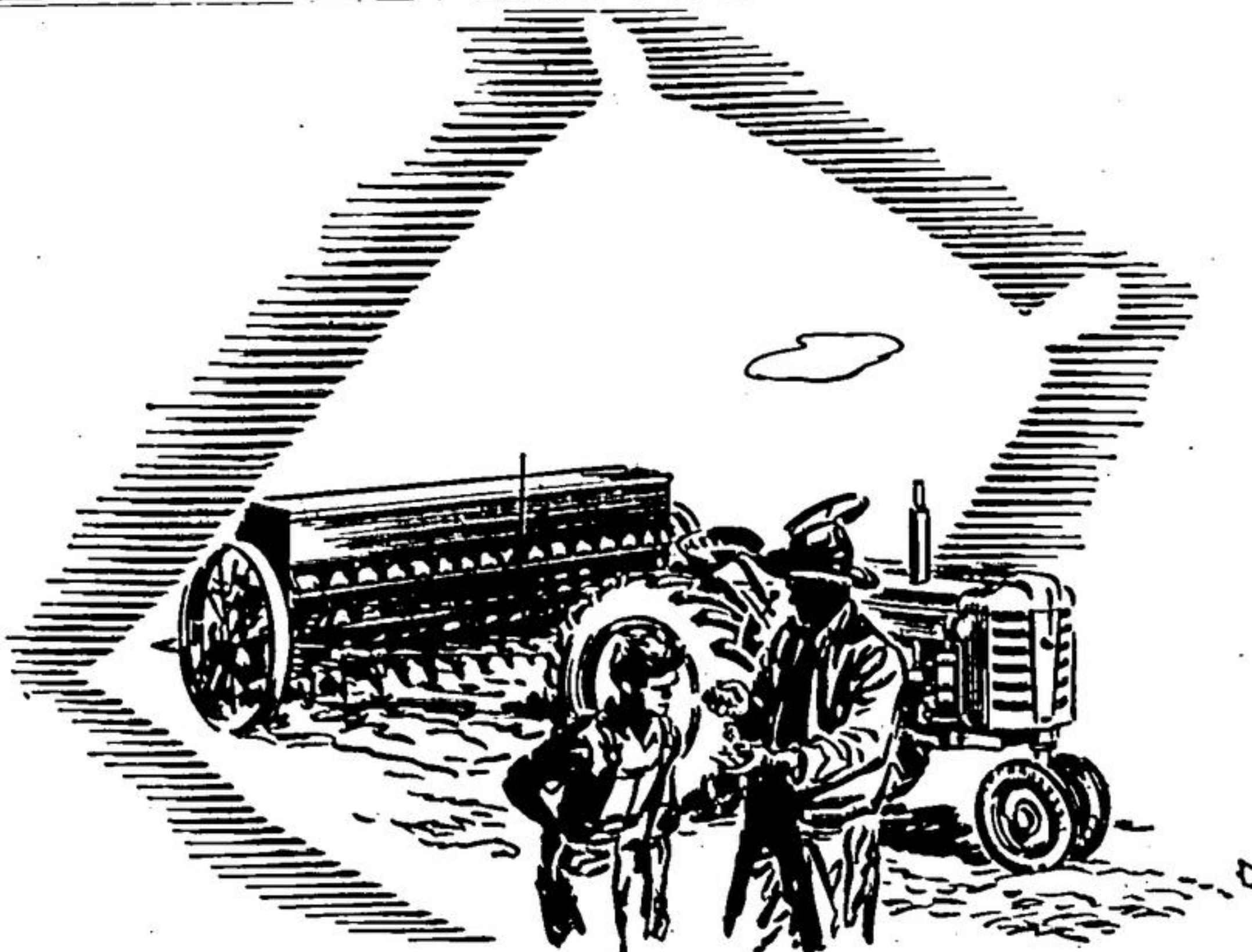
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
