Norval Public School is pleased to be able to report monthly accounts of school happenings. This is our first report.

The purpose of this evening is only to acquaint the teachers with the parents, and to give the latter an opportunity to inspect his child's work in daily classes. If necessary, the parents are free to chat with the teachers concerning their child's progress.

as six at a time, were being found by youngsters or hunters.

It is presumed by hunter organizations and game officials that those birds who managed to escape the storm by keeping ahead of it, were either drowned by the floods or hurled by gale-force winds against trees and into traps.

The few remaining have made scarce hunting for nimrods beating the area in the four-day season.

Three men, accompanied by two hunting dogs, reported they saw no sign of a pheasant in a nine-hour search Wednesday. With cooperation from game officials they made a check of 65 cars and found only 15 had any birds of all.

Most of the others failed to see any sign of pheasant during the day.

Township officials say their area can support and absorb only 1,500 birds, but on the basis of a four-day season, at least 200 licenses issued, and a day limit of three, 2,400 birds could theoretically be shot.

Hunters maintain at least 500 cock birds should be released there immediately, while township officials say they must keep 1,000 birds as breeding stock.

The 48-hour onslaught of wind and floods may force them to buy birds from outside sources, they said.

The Department of Game and Fisheries stock has also been reduced to a basic breeding flock, and there were reports they, too, may have to purchase pheasants from outside sources.
