\$8,000,000 for **New Steel Plant**

H. G. Hilton, president of the Steel Company of Canada Limited has informed shareholders of that company that a new and improved continuous galvanizing plant in Hamilton will cost \$8,000,00. It will deliver sheet steel, galvanized on both sides, completely finished and ready for shipment at the rate of 200 feet per minute. The widths will be up to four feet and the diversified market will be better supplied than it ever has been befure. Production will begin next year, some time after July 1st.
