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Rev. Kenneth Richardson New Anglican Rector

Rev. Kenneth Richardson, presently Anglican rector at Jarvis, will become minister at Georgetown and Glen Williams in January.

A letter from Bishop Bagnall, read at the Sunday services in St. George's and St. Alban's churches informed the congregations of the new appointment. He will succeed Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson, now of St. Catharines, who retired from the active ministry in September after serving the churches here for almost a quarter century.

Archdeacon A. V. Mackintosh of Hamilton will continue as acting rector of the churches until Mr. Richardson arrives in January.

Rev. Kenneth Richardson is a native of St. Catharines and a graduate of Huron College, London, Ont. During the war he served in the Royal Canadian Air Force in Canada and overseas, from 1941 to 1945.

He was ordained a deacon by Bishop Bagnall in St. Thomas Church, in his home parish of St. Catharines in 1950. He was then appointed as assistant curate to Archdeacon A. H. Davis at Holy Trinity Church, Welland, and was ordained priest in 1951 at the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Hamilton. He then became rector of St. Paul's Church, Jarvis and Christ Church, Nanticoke and has been there since that time. He is chaplain to the Niagara Diocesan Servers Guild.

Extensive renovations are being planned to the church rectory prior to the arrival of Mr. Richardson, his wife and their two young children. It is planned to raze a portion of the house at the rear, and add new kitchen and bathroom in the main part of the building, as well as doing some necessary repair work to the foundation.

Wigo Television Moves To New Location

Wigo Television, which has operated in the Cordaro Bldg. since establishing in town a few months ago, is planning a move to larger quarters across the street.

Maurice Goudekting, who opened the business here, will now have the assistance of his brother-in-law, Ed. Wiener, another emigre from Holland who has been a trouble-shooter at the Phillips plant in Leaside since he came to Canada a year ago. Mr. Goudekting's wife is Mr. Wiener's sister.

They will soon be operating in the premises of the recently-closed Horseshoe Grill beside the Municipal Office.

Both families are also planning to move to town from the city this month. They have purchased adjoining houses on Bryon St. in the Sunbeam Heights subdivision.

Mr. Wiener, who comes from Endhoven, owned his own radio and TV store there for eight years. For two years during the war, he worked underground in Holland making small communication sets for Dutch resistance fighters. He is father of 7-year-old twins, Hans and Yolanda.

Mr. and Mrs. Goudekting, who also named their 7-year-old daughter Yolanda, also have a son, Alex 4. It is interesting to note that the Wigo name is derived by combining the first two initials of the names of the partners.

Mr. Bill Leslie, manager of the Roxy Theatre in Georgetown for the past two years, has bought the theatre lease from National Theatres, and starting November 8th, Georgetown's Roxy Theatre will be operated as an independent enterprise. The general policy, however, will remain, and the pictures will still be serviced through the National Theatre booking agency.

Prior to coming to Georgetown, Mr. Leslie, a native of Scotland, lived for many years in Trinidad, B.W.I., where he managed the Globe Cinema, which has a seating capacity of 1800. All the Leslie children were born while Mr. and Mrs. Leslie lived in Trinidad, except daughter Heather who was born in Georgetown, British Guiana. The Leslie family moved from Trinidad to Georgetown, British Guiana, at which time Mr. Leslie owned and operated a hotel. From Georgetown, B.G., the Leslies moved to Georgetown, Ontario, where Mr. Leslie became manager of the Roxy Theatre.

Norval Hill Accident Fatal for Donald Roe

Twenty-two-year-old Donald Roe, of 82 Riverdale Ave., Toronto, was killed almost instantly Saturday evening, when his 1934 Volkswagen panel truck went out of control on the curve on Number 7 Highway as it rounds the hill just west of Norval.

The young man, employed by the Downview Heating Company, Toronto, was en route home at 6.30, when his car went out of control on the dangerous curve, catapulted into the left-hand ditch, and sheared off a hydro pole with the door on the driver's side. The driver was thrown out and the vehicle somersaulted, pinning him beneath.

Dr. J. H. Chamberlain was called to the scene of the accident. Constable George Moore, Milton, investigated.

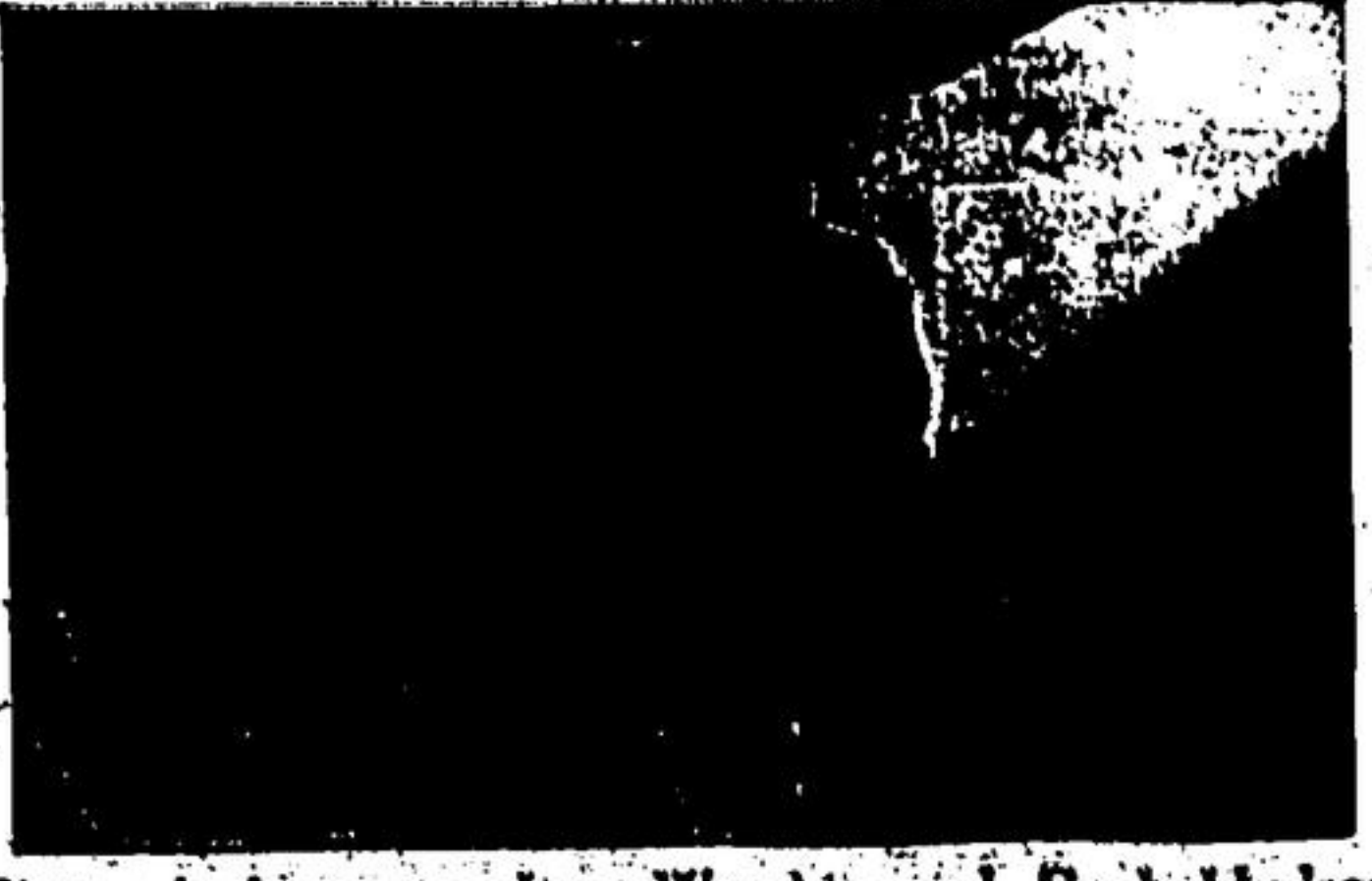
