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

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Prominent Baptist Church Lady Dies

Death of Mrs. Robert Freeman Bessey, 91, in Milton last week severed one of the last remaining links of First Baptist Church, Geor's getown and the family which contributed so strongly to its organiza-

Her husband and his brother were primarily responsible for the building of the present structure in 1869. Robert Bessey, who died in 1924, became a member well over a century ago, in 1849.

Mrs. Bessey, who was the former Jessie Eugenie Webb was born at Rathnam Centre and was a daughter of James and Mary Ann Root Webb. She spent her youth in Ospringe and after her marriage lived in Georgetown. She was a resident of Halton Centennial Manor at the time of her death. She retained a keen interest in the town where she lived for so many years, and occasionally wrote letters to the Herald on topical matters, while keeping in touch locally by reading the newspapers and chatting with friends who visited her in Milton.

Predeceased by two brothers and three sisters, she leaves one sister, Lucy, Mrs. R. Whiteside of Birsay, Susk one brother Irwin Webb of Guelph and several nieces and nep-

Esquesing Council Gives \$400 Flood Relief

Esquesing Township Council made a donation of \$400.00 to the Hurricane Relief Fund at their regular meeting on November 1st. They also authorized a \$15.00 donation to the Poppy Fund. Council engaged Mr. Roy Smith, County Engineer, to prepare plans and specifications for bridges washed out and damaged by

the flood, in the township. Georgetown Fire Brigade was given permission to buy a new cylinder for Scott Air Pack, priced \$2.00. at \$53.00. The treasurer was Instructed to pay \$300.00 to the Town of Georgetown, to be charged to Esquesting Fire Area No. 1.

At a cost of \$18,680.00, the council decided to purchase a Champion 115 h.p. motor grader, model No. 483, subject to the approval of the Dept. of Highways and the Municipul Board. One third or more of the purchase price is to be paid in 1934, and the balance to be divided between 1955 and 1956.

Council approved the Meadowglen Growers subdivision, provided they do not sell or build on Lot No. 4. A by-law was passed to impose a special drainage rate on Lot 8. 7th Concession, Esquesing

The Charles H. Mitchell tender to sugply approximately three thousand yards of satisfactory fill to Lots 16 and 17 on the Town line, was accepted, and the offer of W. R Greenlee to supply, crush and deliver gravel on the Township of Esquesing roads, at 85c pes yard on a five mile haul and 7c per yard mile over five miles, was also accepted. Both these agreements are subject to the approval of the Dept.

of Highways.
