Garbage Still Prominent Council Sees Machine

Council viewed a film on Monday evening prior to council meeting shown by representatives from the Sheridan Equipment Co. in connection with the proposed landfill disposal of garbage in Georgetown. Members of council had previously seen the machine, an Allis-Chalmers, operating at the proposed new disposal spot near the sewage disposal plant.

Following the film some time was given over to discussion. Council did not reach a decision as to the

type of equipment which will be purchased, but will in the near future view a smaller machine, at half the cost, which will be given a chance to work in the garbage area.

Some members favoured the Allis-Chalmers for its versatility — it could be put to many uses such as grading, snow removal, etc. Others favoured the Bulclam which they felt did a better compaction job on the garbage, but would be purchased for sanitary garbage disposal only. Mayor Armstrong was strong in the belief that the machine, no matter what type is purchased, should be used for garbage only. He felt that if it is taken to different parts of the town, garbage would at times be neglected.

George Hewson, solicitor for Sunbeam Construction asked council to give a ruling on the sideline distances between houses on new building lots. The town by-law calls for five feet, while the NHA specifications can be satisfied with four.

Council was hesitant to make such a radical change of the building by-law until such times as the whole set-up has been looked into. They did however pass the following motion in regard to sidelines: "That we amend Section 45 of the Building By-law, adding thereto that it is permissible to build a residence within four feet of the property line, providing that there is a driveway of at least ten feet on the adjacent lot and adjoining the four foot sideline."

Council received a petition, which was turned over to the County Health Unit, complaining of garbage being left outside an apartment building uncovered for some length of time prior to collection day.

Notification was received from the county that the 1954 levy would be \$21,545.45.

Water mains will be installed at once on Orchard Blvd. following a request last month from McNally Construction, and by-laws were given first and second readings for the installation of water mains and sewers on Prince Edward Drive in the Romann Sub. and on Shelly St. in the Sunbeam Heights Sub.
