### Lorne Scots Band Holds **Testimonial Dinner**

Prize-winners at the Canadian National Exhibition this year, the Lorne Scots Band was tendered testimonial dinner last week by the town in appreciation of the honour brought to Georgetown on this and several occasions in the past.

Mayor Jack Armstrong, who was chairman at the event in the Legion Hall, said that while band members come from several towns and are members of an army unit competsing three counties, Georgetown has always looked on the band as its own, and it was a pleasure for town officials to recognize their win in an official way.

Among those who were at the head table, and who spoke briefly were Lt.-Col. John R. Barber, ofticer commanding the regiment; Major Sam Charters, Brampton, who will succeed Col. Barber, in this insition later this year; Major Guy; Major Charles Donaldson; Warden J J. Stewart; Lt.-Col. Gordon Cousens, and Bandmuster Alf Perrott.

Answering a toast to the regiment, proposed by the county warden, Lt.-Col Barber said the Lorne Scots have a record of service second to none, both in wartime and pracetime activities. It had been a disappointment that in World War 2 to serve as a unit, but had rather been used as reinforcements, but no other regiment could boast of having over 2,000 men serving overthree years in a row, the Lorne Scots have had the largest turnout of reserve army campers.
