**Lorne Scots Band Holds
Testimonial Dinner**

Prize-winners at the Canadian
National Exhibition this year, the
Lorne Scots Band was tendered a
testimonial dinner last week by the
town in appreciation of the honour
brought to Georgetown on this
and several occasions in the past.

Mayor Jack Armstrong, who was
chairman at the event in the Le-
gion Hall, said that while band
members come from several towns
and are members of an army unit
comprising three counties, Geo-
rgetown has always looked on the
band as its own, and it was a pleasure
for town officials to recognize their
win in an official way.

Among those who were at the
head table, and who spoke briefly
were Lt.-Col. John R. Barber, of-
ficer commanding the regiment;
Major Sam Charters, Brampton, who
will succeed Col. Barber in this
position later this year; Major Guy;
Major Charles Donaldson; Warden
J. J. Stewart, Lt.-Col. Gordon Cou-
sens, and Bandmaster Alf Perrott.

Answering a toast to the regi-
ment, proposed by the county war-
den, Lt.-Col. Barber said the Lorne
Scots have a record of service sec-
ond to none, both in wartime and
peacetime activities. It had been a
disappointment that in World War 2
the Lorne Scots had not been able
to serve as a unit, but had rather
been used as reinforcements, but no
other regiment could boast of hav-
ing over 2,000 men serving over-
seas. At summer camp, too, for
three years in a row, the Lorne
Scots have had the largest turnout
of reserve army campers.

Deputy Reeve Allan Norton, who
was once a band member, toasted
the band and recalled his happy
associations. He praised the leader-
ship of Mr. Perrott, who replied to
the toast.

Two veteran members, whose
years of service total almost a cen-
tury, Sgt. Kenneth MacDonald and
Sgt. Arthur Herbert, both of Geo-
rgetown, also were asked to speak.
Sgt. Herbert introduced band mem-
bers by groups, calling them to
stand as he named the communities
where they live—Georgetown, Ac-
ton, Milton, Brampton, Streetville
and Glen Williams. He said 28
members were on active service in
World War 2, and also impressed
the fact that members do not get
paid from prize money won or from
fees charged for engagements, all
this money going into the general
treasury.

After the turkey dinner, which
was served by ladies of the Legion
W.A., band members and their
wives, councillors and other guests
present, enjoyed dancing, with en-
tertainment by a Toronto "disc
jockey" who combined clever patter
with his record playing.
