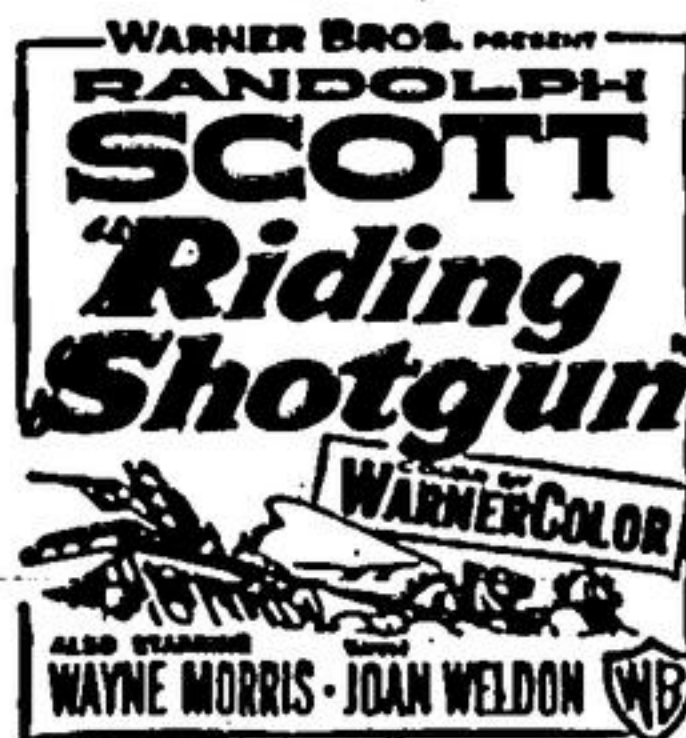

**TYPE AND PRODUCTION  
 GO HAND IN HAND**

Good lookers are also good producers—that's the word from Bruce Stone, Forfar, Ont., as it applies to Holstein cows. Mr. Stone made an exhaustive survey of this subject as a thesis for the Master's degree recently conferred on him by the Ontario Agricultural College.

Selecting at random 300 cows in each of the five classes into which cows are graded according to their bodily confirmation or type, Mr. Stone found that: "Excellent" cows have an average actual production of 15,458 lbs. milk and 570 lbs. fat; Very Good cows 13,807 lbs. milk and 503 lbs. fat; Good Plus cows 12,134 lbs. milk and 439 lbs. fat; Good cows 11,256 lbs. milk and 404 lbs. fat; and Fair cows 10,897 lbs. milk and 392 lbs. fat.

When all the records were equalized by bringing each to a mature equivalent the results bore out the original result. On this basis production was: "Excellent", 14,715 lbs. milk and 543 lbs. fat; Very Good, 13,540 lbs. milk and 494 lbs. fat; Good Plus, 12,794 lbs. milk and 464 lbs. fat; Good, 12,317 lbs. milk and 444 lbs. fat; and Fair, 12,146 lbs. milk and 437 lbs. fat.

In his study Mr. Stone also expressed the results in terms of Breed

Class Average percentages. That is each record was shown as a percentage above or below 100 which was taken as an average of all the records completed in that particular class in Canada in a two-year period. On this basis "Excellent" was 118% for milk and 119% for fat; Very Good, 110 for milk and 110 for fat; Good Plus, 104 for milk and 103 for fat; Good, 99 for milk and 97 for fat; and Fair, 98 for milk and 96 for fat.

Mr. Stone concluded that there was a definite correlation between good type and good production. The better the type the higher the production.

Cows are graded for type out of a possible score of 100. "Excellent" is at least 90 points; Very Good at least 85 but less than 90; Good Plus at least 80 but less than 85; Good at least 75 but less than 80; and Fair at least 65 but less than 75.
