#### Chinguacousy Population Drops 2500 in Century

An item or a picture for the Inatitute's Tweedsmuir History Book was the roll call at the Terra Cotta Institute's Historical Research mewting held last Thursday evening at the home of Mrs. Eric Leslie. The book was on display that night.

At that time even the livestock was listed, and men were taxed according to their sussessions. He also had the first minute book of the Township Council, dated 1821. It was surprising to learn that the population of Chinguacousy in 1851 number 7000. The population is now 2500 less than it was 100 years ago. In the early days there was a lot of industry in the township. Betty Zillo and Pat Vickers played some numbers on the gultar.

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## Many Royal Awards Won by Halton Farmers

Halton may be one of the smallest counties in 'Ontario but what a showing her citizens made in nearly all sections of the great show. First the Wheat King of the World - W. E. Breckon of Burlington, R. R. 2then the Queen's Guineas in Katherine Merry of Oakville, R R 2 but that wasn't all by any means. We did see most of the Dairy Show, so we'll confine our remarks to a Yew of the Halton highlights in the Guernseys, Jerseys, Holsteins and Red Polls,

#### Guernseys

The entries of Joyce Bros., Wm. G. Booth, J. L. Chisholm and M. T. McNabb and Sons were strong contenders throughout. Joyce Bros. did a tremendous job, taking the reserve junior female championship on their winning senior yearling. Twin Elms Merry Heiress, plus at least two red ribbons and a number of other top awards, including a second on their junior herd. Wm. G Booth, not to be duidone, also took two red ribbins and at least one second. J. L. Chisholm also billight home a red ribbon and a cow bred and recently sold by M. T. McNabb and Sons, took the top award for the best Canadian bred cow in the show. When one fealizes that these Halton boys were in there competing with such establishments as those at Freserdale, Henry Bordens, Crossland Farms, Maplewood, to mention but a few of the outstanding Guernsey herds at the Royal-one should have a slight appreciation of their respective achievements.

#### Jerseys

In the Jersey ring the Halton flag was carried by entries from the herds of M. C. Beaty, Ken Ella, Featherstone Bros. and Gerald R. Graham. They too, like their Guernsey brethren did a tremendous job in their strong show which brought entries from Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, the United States as well as practically all the leading herds in Ontario. A few of the Hulton high-lights here include the winning of the reserve junior female championship by M. C Beaty on his winning senior calf, Lindale Design Firefly - another red ribbon on his winning senior get of Brampton Basil Ward, former herd sire at Lindale Farm -- and we should not overlook the reserve senior male championship won by Wm. G. Fletcher on Lindale Basil Xenia Lad, noted son of old Basil Ward, nor the trophy won by the Lindale herd for the best uddered female nor the second award secured on the strong milking four year old class. Ken Ella had third in the dry 3 year old class, fourth on his dry 2 year old, fourth on his sentor bull calf and second on his progeny of dam, to mention but a few of the Rock Ella awards. Gerald R. Graham had a second in the milking three year olds and he and the Featherstone Bros. were well up in a number of other classes.

#### Red Polls

Despite the competition from several herds from western Canada, the Halton boys pretty well swept the boards. Leonard Coulson took all of the championships, including the junior male; senior male and grand championship for males; junfor female; senior female; grand champion female - in fact the same exhibitor won all of the classes with the exception of three. Roy Coulter also brought home one red ribbon, in addition to a number of seconds and thirds. Other Halton exhibitors included George E. Readhead and T. C. Massey, both of whom were strong contenders throughout for seconds and thirds.

#### Holsteins

Halton exhibitors were represented by entries from the herds of Pelletterio Bros., W. H. Robinson, T. H. McGee, Harold Cooper, Tovell Bros. and Lloyd Pickard of Pickard and Clark of Carstairs, Alta. The highlights from a Halton standpoint in this terrific show was the win' by Tom McGee on Haigert Lee Jean Hope which not only won the senfor heifer calf class in an entry of 45, but went on to take the junior female championship.

She later sold in the sale of stars at \$2700. Next was Harold Cooper's second prize award on 'Kneland Farm Annabelle in the strong mature milking class, Annabal also sold in the Holstein Sale of Stars at \$3000 to Romandale Farms. Perhaps next in line was the blue ribbon won by W. H. Robinson on Robros Fond Dandy in the junior yearling bull class. Rumour has it that Dandy was sold privately after the show, to go to South America, at around the \$1500 mark. The Halton ringside got a thrill out of Lloyd Pickard's win in the mature dry class on Sunnybank Texal Dorothy, purchased from Frank G. Stark & Sons at the Maple Consignment Sale last month. Ashville Farms were also well up in the four classes in which they exhibited.
