

**Lumberjacks Educated In Frontier College**

On Thursday, the Married Couples' Club of Norval Presbyterian Church held their regular meeting in the

basement of the church. The evening opened with a sing-song conducted in a very lively manner by Mr. Clifford Waite of Milton, the guest speaker, who was introduced by Rev. G. L. Royal. Mr. Waite is a B.A. of McMaster University and is at present studying

for the ministry. He served in the Bomber Command of the RCAF and won his DFC. He is secretary to the Ontario Farmers Radio Forum and has spent the past four summers at the outposts of Frontier College. Frontier College was indeed the subject of Mr. Waite's address to the club. Mr. Waite opened his speech with a few lively anecdotes and his manner throughout was highly entertaining. He explained how Frontier College was founded in 1890 as a means of educating the lumberjacks. Today there are approximately 75 University graduates who go to camps each year in the most remote outposts as labour teachers. In the day-time they rough it with the men and in the evenings they conduct classes in a wide range of subjects. The main point is to gain the confidence of these men, many of whom have the usual linguistic and ideological difficulties common to new Canadians. Mr. Waite stressed in particular the life of the "extra gangs" on the rail ways, many of whom live in box cars. He repeatedly emphasized Canada's need for new Canadians and in turn the need of these new Canadians for help from us and in particular their repeated demands for a satisfactory explanation of the democratic system of government.

Mr. Waite was warmly thanked by Mr. Royal who pointed out that the whole talk had been highly informative as well as entertaining. Mr. Royal Perry favoured the meeting with a solo and the rest of the evening was spent in the unravelling of quiz riddles and puzzles. The tables were tastefully decorated and a most enjoyable lunch was served by the lunch committee, Mr. and Mrs. Craig Reid, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Reid, and Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Perry. The central committee, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Clark, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Hunter, and Mr. and Mrs. Sam Mileham were responsible for a most enjoyable evening.

**Farmers Must Package Is Forum Opinion**

National farm radio forum has started another season and as in former years Halton County groups are participating.

The subject under discussion November 15 was "The Farmer's Share". This was discussed under headings: How have your food buying habits changed in the last ten years? and How can the farmer adjust himself to new trends in consumer buying?

All forums reporting agreed that our buying habits have changed greatly. We buy in smaller quantities and owing to new methods of processing and freezing we enjoy a greater quantity of fruits, vegetables, and meat all year round. Some think there is too wide a spread between the price paid by the consumer and that received by the producer.

If the farmer is to meet the demands of the public, his produce must be first quality, well graded and presented in an attractive way. Many farmers can't afford to package their own commodities individually, but practically all forums mentioned co-operative marketing as a possible solution.
