History was made at Peel Memorial Hospital on Saturday night when Mrs. Douglas Swackhammer, R. R. 2, Brampton, Lave birth to the 1000th baby to be born in the hospital in 1954. This establishes a record number of births in any one calendar year since the hospital was opened 30 years ago. The previous high total was in 1953 when 980 infants first saw the light of day at Peel Memorial. Mrs. Swackhammer's husband was once Massey-Harris dealer in George-

In 1925, when the hospital was first opened, the number of births totalled only 21 for that year. There has been a gradual increase in births, eversince then and greatly accelerated inrecent years. This is evidenced by the fact that in the 30 years of its. service to the community, 10,623 babies have come into the world in the Brampton Hospital, almost the equal of the town's present popula-

Not counted in this grand total are numerous cases (at least five this year) where the stork was somewhat deceptive or too hasty and the babies were born en route to the hospital. One such case was reported on Sunday of this week. These cases are not included in the hospital's birth

The Swackhammer baby is a boy, weighed 9 lb. 3 oz at birth Mother and child are both doing well. The name is not "Thousand," but Stephen Murray Two older Swackhammer children, Douglas 7 and Christine 3 were also born in Peel Memorial Hospital

R I Blain, president of the Hospital Association, paid a special visit to the maternity ward on Monday to offer his congratulations to the mother and on behalf of the Board of Governors he presented Stephen Murray with a baby's silver mug to mark the historic event
