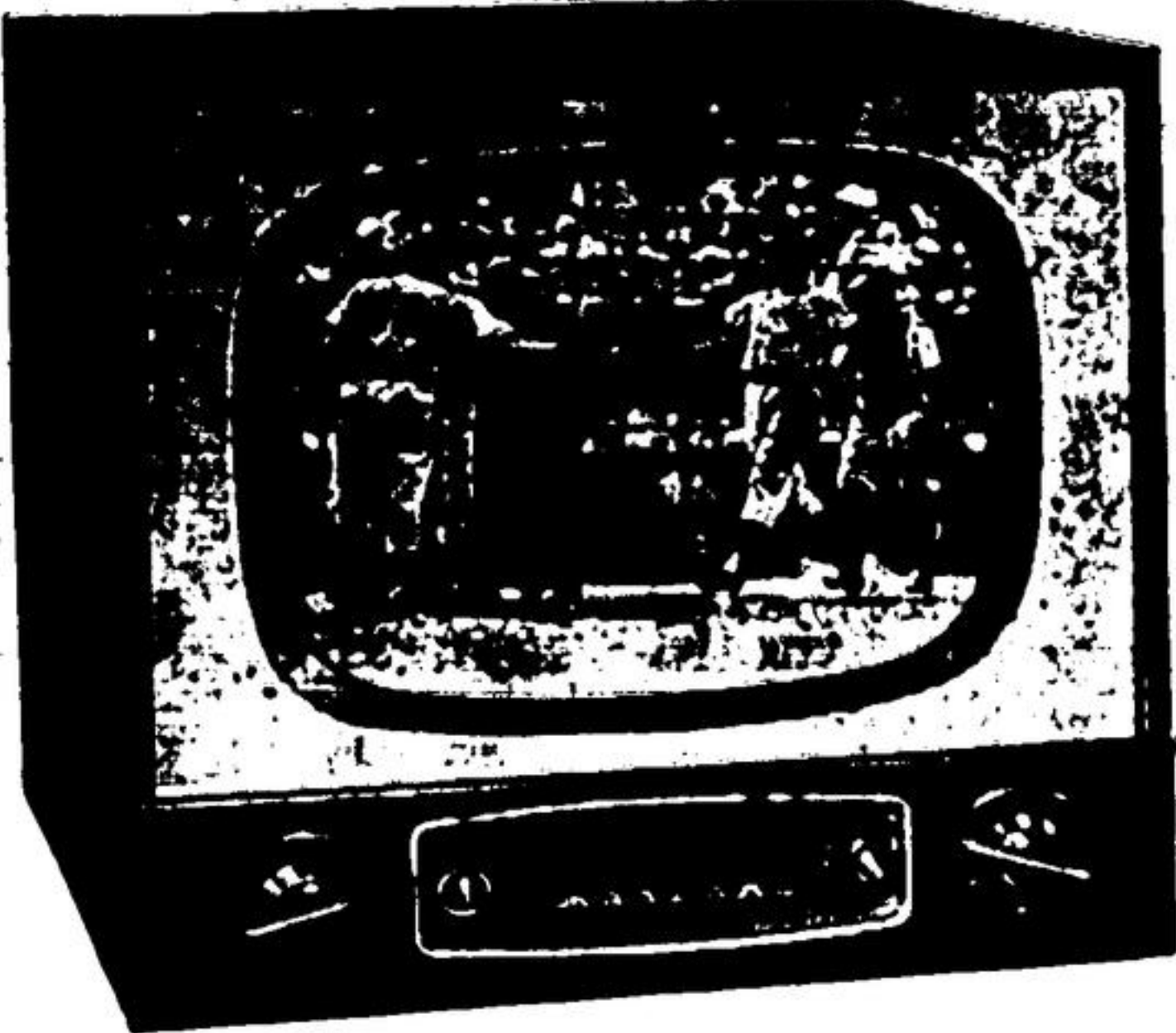

believe we made it. The descent was worse than the ascent, in my opinion—nearly forty hair-pin bends in a row. I had my eyes closed a good deal of the time—hard on the nerves.

"Crossed into Italy—did some shopping—started having trouble with the language. Next day drove through Verona—saw Italian Opera House, Juliet's Tomb, etc. Had an Italian dinner. They start with spaghetti—then have five more courses. Camped just outside of Venice. Drove into Venice and took tour of canals. The streets are all rivers, so you can't drive your car in—have to leave it on outskirts in a fabulous municipal garage. I was absolutely fascinated with Venice—would have hated to miss it.

"Next day drove through flat uninteresting country. Camped beside Adriatic Sea. Pouring rain next day—mud to the knees. Drove to Rome and found a camping site smack in the middle of the city. Stayed in Rome two nights—very hot—lots to see.

"Proceeded from Rome—camped near Florence next night. Went sight-seeing in Florence—then on to the Leaning Tower of Pisa—entered the first part of the Riviera. Met some English people and I said how much I missed my tea. Later on in afternoon heard horn behind us—it was the English people with tea for me.

Camped by Mediterranean Sea, and the next day crossed border into France. Saw famous Monte Carlo. Camped early by Sea and went swimming. Next morning went swimming. Next morning, away till about eleven. Had a lovely drive and drove through several interesting cities. Did not think much of French sanitation. We

stopped in Fountainsbleau and saw Palace. Arrived in Paris shortly after lunch, and found a hotel for 55 cents per night per person. A girl in the office gave me the address. Nothing fancy of course, but clean, which is the main thing.

"We stayed in Paris two nights, and continued on our way Wednesday morning. Stopped in Reims, which is a centre for the champagne trade. We saw excellent champagne for \$1.50 per bottle. Drove on and noticed many war cemeteries along the way.

Next morning we saw remains of Maginot Line. Crossed into Luxembourg. In Luxembourg City we toured the studios of Radio Luxembourg (they broadcast to England) and saw the studio that Lord Haw Haw used to broadcast from during the war.

Crossed into Belgium. Drove to Han-sur-Lesse where we took a two and one half hour tour through Grotte De Han. Had coffee in caves and boat ride on underground lake. Camped near Brussels.

"Stayed in Brussels two nights, then drove to Ostend where we camped for the night. We arose at 4.30 in order to get the ferry back to Dover. We had a very smooth crossing, and I wasn't at all sick. "We made it a point to have a meal out in every country. The Germans only have dessert on Sundays. I think I liked the Belgian food best.

"Everywhere we went people took our pictures (out of the backs of buses, even). Lots of people stood on the side of the roads and killed themselves laughing. Guess we did look funny with the car back down, and tents, etc. on top. Also we were usually drying laundry out the side."
