Farm Industry Requires Skilled Hourly Workers

Directors of Esquesing Agricultural Society, meeting in the community hall, Stewarttown, on Saturday for their annual dinner, were told by J A. Carroll that farming is becoming more and more a skilled industry and that in future, successful far mers will employ skilled labour in place of the "hired man" system and working from sunup to sun

down Citing an efficiency increase of 60% in farm production since the war, Mr. Carroll, who is assistant deputy minister of agriculture, said that there has been a decrease of 35% in numbers of farm workers

and an increase of 25% in production "Can any other industry boast of this?" he asked

Scotching popular talk that prices of farm produce are responsible for the high cost of living, Mr Carroll said that the only way to establish this is to compare the purchasing power of an hour's labour today with past periods. A survey shows that it is quite the contrary Comparing this year with 1924 it has been proven that an hour's labour will buy more than twice as much milk and butter and three times as many eggs.

he said Speaking of the farming future, and the present high rate of industrialization in this part of Ontario, he said that land will become increasingly important. Up to the present it has been plentiful and cheap, whereas he had noted white visiting Britain and the continent that the reverse is true. Four hundred thousand acres of farmland have been absorbed by industry in a decade here.

Growth of population is a bright spot in the farm scene and he predicted that farm prices would continue to be bolstered by an increased domestic demand as morepeople emigrate to Canada.

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
