### SIMPLE TREE SPRAY MAY PREVENT FIRES

Georgetown firemen not only stand ready for emergency, but have a genuine interest in fire prevention as well.

Each year at the Christmas season, they are aware of the dangers of trees which become tinder dry in homes and which are potential sour-

ces of trouble. One tip which they pass on is to never leave tree lights on unless someone is in the room. Merchants, too, are reminded that it is dangerous and foolish to leave a lighted

tree in a store window overnight. A suggested method of making a tree fire resistant is to mix a simple formula at home and spray it on the tree. Ingredients are: 9 oz. borax, 4 oz. boracic acid, 1 teaspoon detergent and a gallon of water. It doesn't take long to do this and it will pay dividends in peace of mind.

# School Girls Injured Knocked From Bicycle

Jacqueline Morrow, 11, sustained severe injuries when her bicycle col-·lided with a car driven by Harold Eagles, Smith & Stone office employee Thursday noon.

The accident occurred when Jacqueline, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Morrow, Victoria St., was rounding the John St. hill after passing through the railway culvert. Mr. Eagles was proceeding towards the culvert.

Jacqueline's sister Sharon, 7, who was a passenger on the bicycle was shaken up and had bruises on her left side, knee and wrist. Jacqueline, more seriously injured, was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton and is still in hospital. A bad gash in her left knee required 20 stitches. She had two broken bones in her left hand, abrasions to the left side of her face and an eye injury which proved not as serious as at first feared. The girls were on their way to

### John Ord Is New Hewson Law Partner

Another new lawyer is coming to Georgetown.

John D. Ord will become a partner with George C. Hewson in the Main Street practice which Mr. Hewson established a year ago after buying Kenneth M. Langdon's practice. The partners will share office accommodation in the house beside the Presbyterian Church where Mr. Hewson moved earlier this year.

The two lawyers were classmates at Osgoode Hall, where Mr. Ord graduated in 1951. Son of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Ord of Port Perry, he is a native of Islington. After graduating from Etobicoke Collegiate, Mr. Ord joined the RCAF and served overseas three years as a pilot in England, Italy, Germany and Egypt.. He obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Toronto after the war, then completed his education at Osgoode Hall.

Mr. Ord has been working in the law office of Croll, Borins and Shiff in the city, where one of the partners is federal member of parliament David Croll. He was also for a time working with G. Arthur Martin, a top city criminal lawyer. At college he took the Governor General's medal for proficiency in English.

His wife, June Scott, and their son Robin, 2, are at present visiting in England with her parents who farm near Shrewsbury and will be coming home at Christmas time. Mr. and Mrs Ord are at present living at Port Credit and will be moving to Georgetown in the future.

The huge farmhouse where Mr and Mrs. W. H. Reid and their son Craig now live, will become the kingpin of the Delrex subdivision early in January when it will be converted into an office building-for Rex Heslop's business enterprise.

A new home for the Reids being built by Mr. Heslop near Charlotte McCullough's home on the Limehouse sideroad will be ready in the next few weeks and they will be moving there early in the new year. Mr. Healop then plans an immediate move of his complete office staff to the farm from Rezdale, and will follow this with a mass movement of all his machinery and supplies to his new Georgetown base. At present he has a temporary field office erected on

the property. Mass production of at least 600 houses is expected to begin on the farm in March. This will be the first unit of the subdivision which will at . least double Georgetown's population and add dozens of industries to the town's economy.

Start on a railway siding into the McClure farm may be made later this week. Surveyors, directed by William Carr, are presently making progress on their survey of the ten farms purchased by the Delrex com-

The industrial area on the north side of No. 7 highway is expected to be laid out by spring. No specific news of new factories locating here will come till then, Mr. Heslop says, though he already is in contact with

several firms which are interested. Mr. Heslop has offered a 3-acre aite on part of his property for a town garbage dump, which will tie in with council's plans for moving the dump from the park. The dump site will not cost the town any money, Mr. Healop says.
