## W. H. Reid Farmhouse will be Heslop Office Headquarters

The huge farmhouse where Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Reid and their son Craig now live, will become the kingdom of the Delrex subdivision early in January when it will be converted into an office building for Rex Heslop's business enterprise.

A new home for the Reids being built by Mr. Heslop near Charlotte McCullough's home on the Limehouse sidewalk will be ready in the next few weeks and they will be moving there early in the new year. Mr. Heslop then plans an immediate move of his complete office staff to the farm from Rexdale, and will follow this with a mass movement of all his machinery and supplies to his new Georgetown base. At present he has a temporary field office erected on the property.

Mass production of at least 600 houses is expected to begin on the farm in March. This will be the first unit of the subdivision which will at least double Georgetown's population and add dozens of industries to the town's economy.

Start on a railway siding into the McClure farm may be made later this week. Surveyors, directed by William Carr, are presently making progress on their survey of the ten farms purchased by the Delrex company.

The industrial area on the north side of No. 7 highway is expected to be laid out by spring. No specific news of new factories locating here will come till then. Mr. Heslop says, though he already is in contact with several firms which are interested.

Mr. Heslop has offered a 3-acre site on part of his property for a town garbage dump, which will tie in with council's plans for moving the dump from the park. The dump site will not cost the town any money, Mr. Heslop says.

### John Ord Is New Hewson Law Partner

Another new lawyer is coming to Georgetown.

John D. Ord will become a partner with George C. Hewson in the Main Street practice which Mr. Hewson established a year ago after buying Kenneth M. Langdon's practice. The partners will share office accommodation in the house beside the Presbyterian Church where Mr. Hewson moved earlier this year.

The two lawyers were classmates at Osgoode Hall, where Mr. Ord graduated in 1951. Son of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Ord of Port Perry, he is a native of Islington. After graduating from Etobicoke Collegiate, Mr. Ord joined the RCAF and served overseas three years as a pilot in England, Italy, Germany and Egypt. He obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Toronto after the war, then completed his education at Osgoode Hall.

Mr. Ord has been working in the law office of Croll, Borins and Shiff in the city, where one of the partners is federal member of parliament David Croll. He was also for a time working with G. Arthur Martin, a top city criminal lawyer. At college he took the Governor General's medal for proficiency in English.

### School Girls Injured Knocked From Bicycle

Jacqueline Morrow, 11, sustained severe injuries when her bicycle collided with a car driven by Harold Eagles, Smith & Stone office employee Thursday noon.

The accident occurred when Jacqueline, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Morrow, Victoria St., was rounding the John St. hill after passing through the railway culvert. Mr. Eagles was proceeding towards the culvert.

Jacqueline's sister Sharon, 7, who was a passenger on the bicycle was shaken up and had bruises on her left side, knee and wrist. Jacqueline, more seriously injured, was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton and is still in hospital. A bad gash in her left knee required 20 stitches. She had two broken bones in her left hand, abrasions to the left side of her face and an eye injury which proved not as serious as at first feared. The girls were on their way to school.

Spectacular, but without major damage was an accident later that day on Queen St. when a transport owned by Mitchell Transport, Hamilton, careened onto the lawn of Herald publisher Walter Biehn, wrenched its way between two large trees and came to rest against a terrace.

The truck, driven by James Menger, was proceeding towards the highway and swung wide to avoid hitting a car driven by Bud Varney approaching the intersection on McNab St. Just as he swung, the driver noticed an approaching car on Queen driven by Reeve Stan Allen, and he ticked the bumper as he pulled his truck into the lawn. The truck was damaged, and also an ornamental stone retaining wall.

### SIMPLE TREE SPRAY MAY PREVENT FIRES

Georgetown firemen not only stand ready for emergency, but have a genuine interest in fire prevention as well.

Each year at the Christmas season, they are aware of the dangers of trees which become tinder dry in homes and which are potential sources of trouble.

One tip which they pass on is to never leave tree lights on unless someone is in the room. Merchants, too, are reminded that it is dangerous and foolish to leave a lighted tree in a store window overnight.

A suggested method of making a tree fire resistant is to mix a simple formula at home and spray it on the tree. Ingredients are: 9 oz. borax, 4 oz. boric acid, 1 teaspoon detergent and a gallon of water. It doesn't take long to do this and it will pay dividends in peace of mind.

## Commerce Chamber Promotes Many Things for Public Good

Georgetown Chamber of Commerce has been interested in a number of projects, large and small, this year.

It is not the Chamber's purpose to carry out any specific project, but rather to encourage other public groups in things which will benefit the public at large.

So it is that they were instrumental in sparking the town council and the Women's Institute to make improvements in the park which include new stone entranceway, face-lifting of the ticket office and a sidewalk from Charles Street to the entrance.

Another project, designed to relieve congested parking conditions downtown was creation of a parking area behind a section of stores, with owner J. J. Gibbens cooperating with the town council and merchants to provide the land. The Chamber erected signs pointing to this free parking area.

Swings on a playground on lower John Street supplemented swings placed last year in the park, and children have had hours of enjoyment from this inexpensive amusement.

The Chamber has worked closely

with merchants in providing decorative lighting for Main Street during the Christmas season. Irwin Noble and Chick Jewell are acting for the merchants in this, and more coloured lights will be strung this year for a festive air.

Now the Chamber is deep in plans to encourage building of a hospital and a municipal swimming pool, and can take some share of credit some day when these become a reality.
