**More Than Economics
in Daily Living: Waite**

We are in danger of becoming economic animals, more concerned with prices, good food and personal comfort than in things of greater value—the privilege of glorifying God in one's work.

These thoughts were expressed by Clifford Waite when he addressed members of Halton farm forums who gathered in Trafalgar Hall for their annual fall rally.

Mr. Waite said many still remember with bitterness the depression of 1929, and are no longer working for the joy of working, but rather as a means to an end. Driven by economic pressure and insecurity many farmers fail to appreciate the dignity of their calling and suffer from an inferiority complex.

Farm forums have done a great deal to overcome this handicap, Mr. Waite continued. We should strive for something bigger than ourselves and endeavor to leave for posterity an earth that will be productive and fruitful. More time should be given to developing the fruits of the spirit, joy, kindness, humility and fellowship. Children should learn things of God at home, not just at Sunday school.

J. E. Whitlock, district representative, spoke briefly explaining some economic problems facing farmers today. Mrs. Roy Coulter, folk school chairman outlined this phase of community work, explaining how it is set up and its value.

In opening the meeting Stan Turner, county chairman, expressed good wishes to the forums in their meetings this season. Vern McArthur, with Mrs. Coulter at the piano, led in a song. Mrs. Cairns and Mrs. Gorter sang duets. Mrs. Haight added humor to the program with readings. Her last offering, My White Horse was a fitting climax to an excellent program.
