### Town Will Prosecute as IGA Flouts Closing By-Law

Charged with contravening the closing by-law for Georgetown stores, a case against the local IGA Supermarket was adjourned until a later date when it came up before Magistrate K. M. Langdon in court here Wednesday.

The case was laid by the town when Bob Caldwell and Bruce Williamson, who operate the new store on the highway, announced a few weeks ago in an advertisement in the Herald, that they planned to open the store on Thursday afternoon. The first day it was open, Cpl. Beckett of the Provincial Police detachment investigated and laid the charge on behalf of the town.

The IGA operators, who were represented in court by a Toronto lawyer, C. C. Downey, pleaded not guilty to the charge and are disputing the validity of the by-law.

The adjournment was asked by Mr. Downey because of the fact that Magistrate Langdon, who was at that time a practicing lawyer, had been engaged by the town to draw up the by-law. He asked that an adjournment sine die be given, and another magistrate who has a legal background, be brought in to hear the case. George Hewson is acting for the town in the case.

The present by-law, which the store is disputing, calls for business places to close at 6:30 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Saturdays; at 12:30 p.m. Thursdays; and 6:00 p.m. Saturdays.

The IGA at present is following the policy of closing all day Monday and remaining open on Thursday afternoon.

### Flies to New Brunswick For Funeral of Uncle

Mrs. Don Barrager will be returning tomorrow from Port Elgin, New Brunswick, where she was called last week by the death of her uncle. She made the trip by plane.
