This letter from Woodbridge, signed by Mrs R B Farr, tells the story

Dear Ladies Sometimes when a group tries to be helpful and kind they like to know that their efforts have been appreciated and I expect you have thought often about all those sandwiches your branch made as well as the other food you sent over to this area during the emergency of "Hurricane Hazel."

The day the sandwiches came into our church we had food on hand that had to be used so'a couple of us took them home and put them'in our freezers. We decided that they could be saved until Sunday and make our work and meal planning easier for that day and that proved out very nicely. We had soup and sandwiches for Sunday night supper and they were really good, were moist, and

It was gratifying to see the response from people who lived miles and miles away, the need was so great here I wish I could just drop in and talk to you about the relief work that was done. To us it was marvelous to see people of every race and creed all working together shoulder to shoulder to help clear away the debris.

In our centre we fed as many as 600 in a day and what food was not sent in we could requisition through the Red Cross. The Salvation Army were wonderful too. One group of ladies brought in a 4 gallon crock of hot apple sauce, others 40 pies, or cauliflower to feed 200 people, or huge pots of stew ready to heat and serve. Potatoes, turnips, milk, just everything.

Feeding this many people for so many days was a chore, so you see we were very thankful to you for the sandwiches to help us make Sunday a less strenuous day. Thank you so much and may God bless you in your efforts to do good.


