## Wake Ford, Steve Eason Join Quarter Century Club

Wakefield Ford and Steven Eason were welcomed into membership in the Quarter Century Club when members of this Provincial Paper organization gathered in the Legion Auditorium on Thursday for their annual get-together.

Introduction of the new members boosted the total to 41. Nineteen of these are employed in the mill and office and 22 associate members have retired from the company's service.

Presentation of engraved wrist watches was made by Miss Lena McNally, who as president of the club was chairman at the dinner. Miss McNally also presented a watch to Mrs. Chester Hill, whose husband became eligible for membership before his death earlier this year.

Rosa Duncan, mill manager, spoke briefly, particularly emphasizing the safety program which clubs in the various Abitibi mills have promoted in a one year period, he said, accidents in mills had decreased by 43 per cent, showing how effective the work had been.

He read a letter from company president D. W. Ambridge, expressing his regret that it was impossible for him to be present in person. Mr. Ambridge was instigator of the clubs when they were first organized six years ago. In all companies there is a total of 896 active and 354 associate members. The local men were two of 103 men and women who became members in 1954.

Mr. Duncan said it is pleasant to meet and renew acquaintances with people who have given so many years of service, and particularly with those who have retired and who are not seen at their accustomed posts at work.

Miss McNally asked for a minute's silence in memory of five men who died in the year. W. C. Reynolds, George Barnes, Chester Hill, Charles Hoare and Thomas Treanor. She also expressed regret that three members were ill and could not attend, Walter Peck, Robert Buchanan, and Chester Scott.

Turkey dinner was served by ladies of the Legion Auxiliary to members, their wives and friends who were present. George Glassford's Orchestra played during dinner and for dancing afterwards.

Fred McCartney was elected the new president, and other officers for next year are George Smith, vice president, Wakefield Ford, secretary, and Dick Grace, treasurer.

The new president spoke briefly. Fred McNally thanked the committee who arranged the evening and Arthur Herbert expressed thanks to the catering group. Teletypes were read by Miss McNally, expressing good wishes from similar clubs in Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur and Thorold.
