WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Willis Account \$3,500
For Annexation Service**

A \$3,500 account from Toronto lawyer Harry Willis was passed by council Monday night.

The account, for services in connection with the annexation of a large tract of Esquewaugh Township in January, covered "preparation of agreement, by law and briefs, arranging for appointment before the Municipal Board . . . presenting the briefs before the Board, all out attendances, interviews and preparation thereof including disbursements" according to a statement submitted by Mr. Willis, and was for negotiations from June, 1954 until the annexation is completed.

In a letter, Mr. Willis explained "We have given this account our most earnest consideration, and we had a great deal of preparation and disbursements in the nature of long distance telephone calls and other expenses in connection with the whole matter." The account was exclusive of the services of George Hewson, local lawyer, who will submit his own bill to council.

Finance chairman Garfield McIlvray explained to council that, while a motion passed at a previous meeting empowered the finance committee and town treasurer to pass any accounts for payment submitted until the end of the year, he thought accounts of such size should come before council as a whole.

Mayor Armstrong asked for a show of hands, and all members voted to pay the bill.
