

Christmas day brought sadness to the home of Mayor Jack Armstrong with the sudden death of his unclear. J. Clarence Armstrong, 59.

Mr. Armstrong had planned to spend the holiday in town and en route from Thorold spent the night in a Toronto hotel. He was found dead in bed, after suffering a heart attack
