11 FATAL ACCIDENTS IN HALTON COUNTY

In 11 fatal accidents in Halton County from last January until September 14 people lost their lives in this district. Figures just released for the nine month period compare this to 12 fatal accidents of the previous year, when 13 lost their lives. The death rate is up so far this year — and this is the worst season for accidents now.

In that period there were 772 accidents on county roads and highways compared to 706 a year ago. Altogether 181 persons were injured, compared to 124 in the same period in 1953.

The total number of accidents reported in Ontario during that time this year was the startlingly high amount of 44,961 accidents.

Don't think accidents are limited to highways. Of these 44,000 accidents, 17,716 were in cities, 3,580 in towns, 807 in villages, 12,583 on highways, 5,598 on county roads and 4,677 on township roads.

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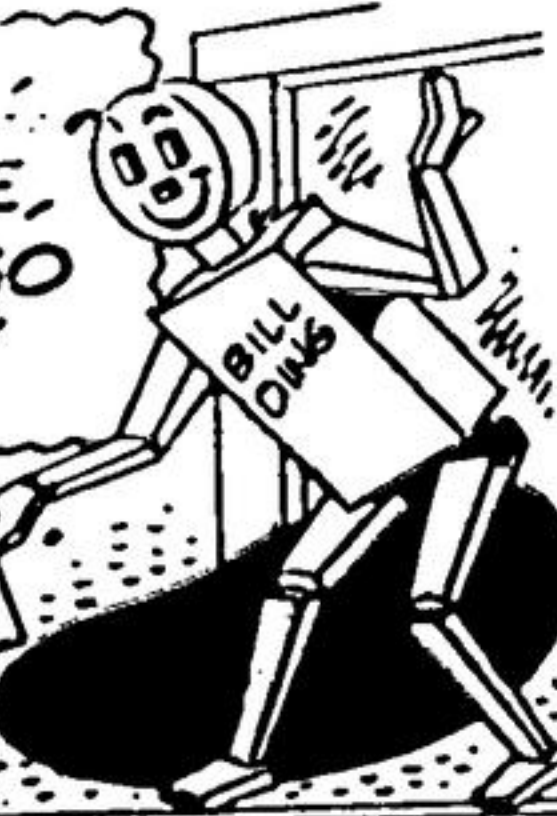
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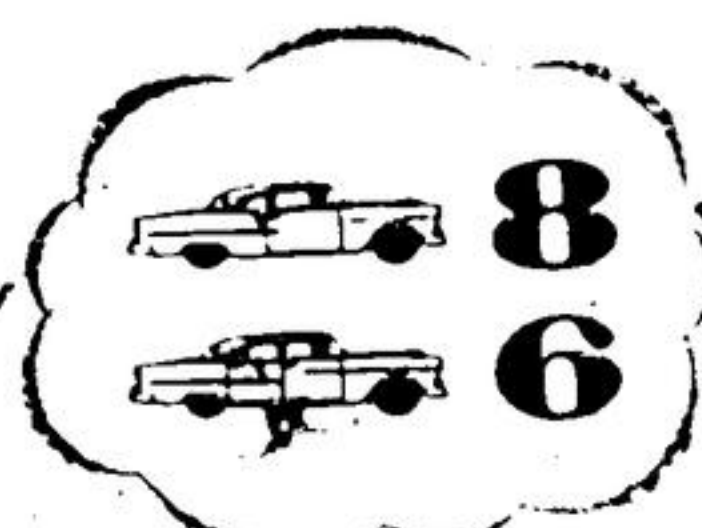
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
