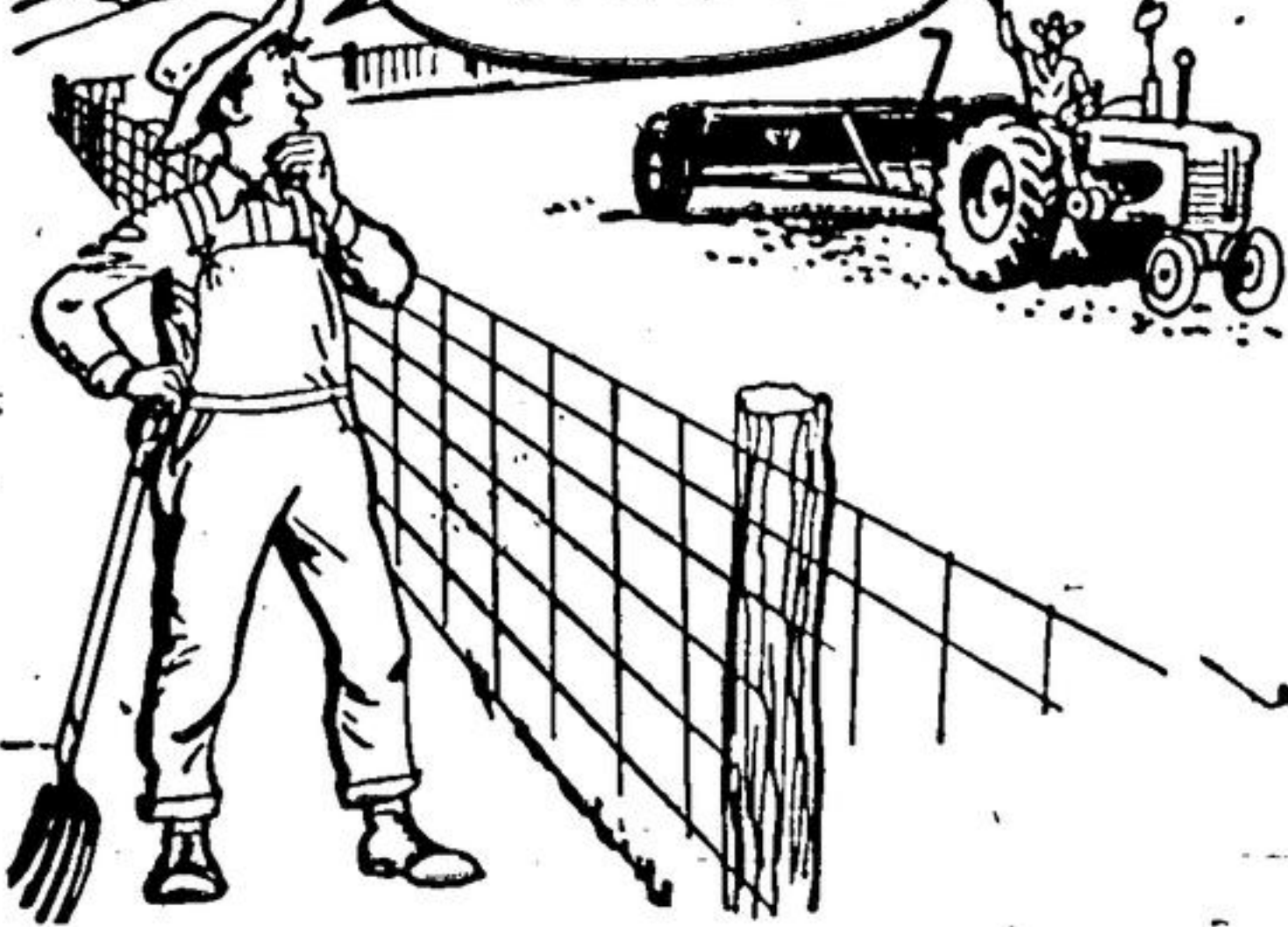

Grand Union-Carroll's Record Net Profit

The Grand Union Company and its subsidiaries, which include Grand Union-Carroll's Ltd. with headquarters in Hamilton, chalked up the largest net profit in its 82 year history in the third quarter of the current fiscal year.

The firm had net earnings of \$801,401 for the three months ended November 27th, 1954. This is an increase of 30 per cent over the \$613,898 figure in the comparable period a year earlier.

Before taxes, profit had been \$1,666,401 against \$1,218,898. Retail sales in the quarter were 7.4 per cent higher, totalling \$55,019,307, as against \$51,208,490.

The gain in profit carried net earnings in the nine months to November 27th, 1954, to \$2,197,830 after taxes, as compared with \$1,898,011 in the same nine months of last year.

After preferred dividends, net profit in the three month period was equal to \$1,024,848 on the 715,449 common shares outstanding. This compared with \$824,848 on the 671,504 shares outstanding in the like period a year earlier. The net for the nine month period was equal to \$2,688,848 a share, against \$2,255.

Since the close of its 1953 fiscal year on February 27, 1954, the company has opened 29 new supermarkets and closed 33 older stores. It now operates a total of 361 stores in New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont and Ontario.

Ralph D. Lyle, vice president and general manager of the Canadian Division, Grand Union-Carroll's, said that plans are complete to open four stores before the end of March.

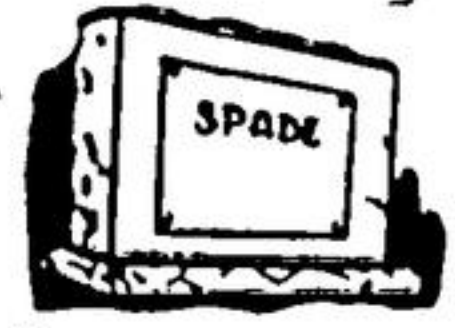
