WEBSTER HOLSTEINS HAVE \$275 AVERAGE

The small, but select herd of purebred Holsteins maintained by the late F. J. Webster at Picton, was dispersed December 30, at Oakville with 35 head bringing a total of \$9,645.00 for a general average of \$275.00. Eleven milking females averaged \$335.00, six bred heifers \$250.00, ten open heifers \$210, seven heifer calves \$195 and the herd sire brought \$475.

The top price of \$535 was paid by Pradol Farms, Brampton, for the four year old cow Carry, New Priority V1, Pradol Farms also paid the top price for an open heifer of \$310.00 and the second highest price for a bred heifer of \$285.00.

Top price for a bred heifer was \$300 which amount was paid twice by L. L. Pearson & Son, Thamsford. Pearson also secured another bred heifer at \$220.

Curtis Doozee, Picton paid the top price for a heifer calf of \$300.00 and also purchased the second highest priced heifer calf at \$250.00.

Glenafon Precedence, the eight-year-old herd sire went to Plant Bros., Brantford, Ontario, at \$475.00. He is an XX son of the noted Markman, was nominated for All-Canadian Senior Yearling Bull in 1948 and was Grand Champion at the Prince Edward County Black & White Day in 1950. This dam is classified as "Excellent" the highest rating attainable for conformation and has an eight lactation lifetime total of 117,136 lbs. milk containing 4,105 lbs. fat.

Other good prices paid include: \$400.00 by Donald H. Hunter, Unionville, Ont., for a milking female; \$400 by H. J. McFarland, Picton, for a milking female; \$385.00 by W. Von Huchoten, Campbellville, for a milking female; \$370 by Grant Cranston, Gleanford Station for a milking female; \$325 by A. Hansen, Bogota, Colombia, for a milking female; \$250 by Elmer S. Stolzf, Alliston, for an open heifer; and \$225 by Deimer-Wilson, Alliston, for an open heifer.

Plan Physio-Therapy At Peel Memorial

Peel Memorial Hospital is soon to have a physio-therapy department where those in hospital and out-patients may receive this type of treatment.

For some months a joint committee of the Board of Governors and the Hospital's Medical Staff has been investigating this matter to determine the need, the space required and available for such a department at Peel Memorial, the cost of the necessary equipment and the expense of operating such a health service.

At the last meeting of the Board of Governors, the committee, headed by Mr. Walter Misenar, recommended the setting up of such a department as soon as possible.

Mr. Misenar in bringing in the recommendation explained that the three members of the Medical Staff on the committee, Doctors Eagleson, Garrioch and Ross, had reported unanimously in favour of such a service.

It was their considered opinion that the department could be fitted into a small room in the basement of the new wing. The cost of the required alterations to the room and for the purchase of the necessary equipment, would be between \$700.00 and \$800.00.

While it was felt that it would take time to make the department cover its own cost, it was the considered opinion of the committee in which the board concurred, that there was a real need for this type of treatment locally and that before many months of operation it would at least become

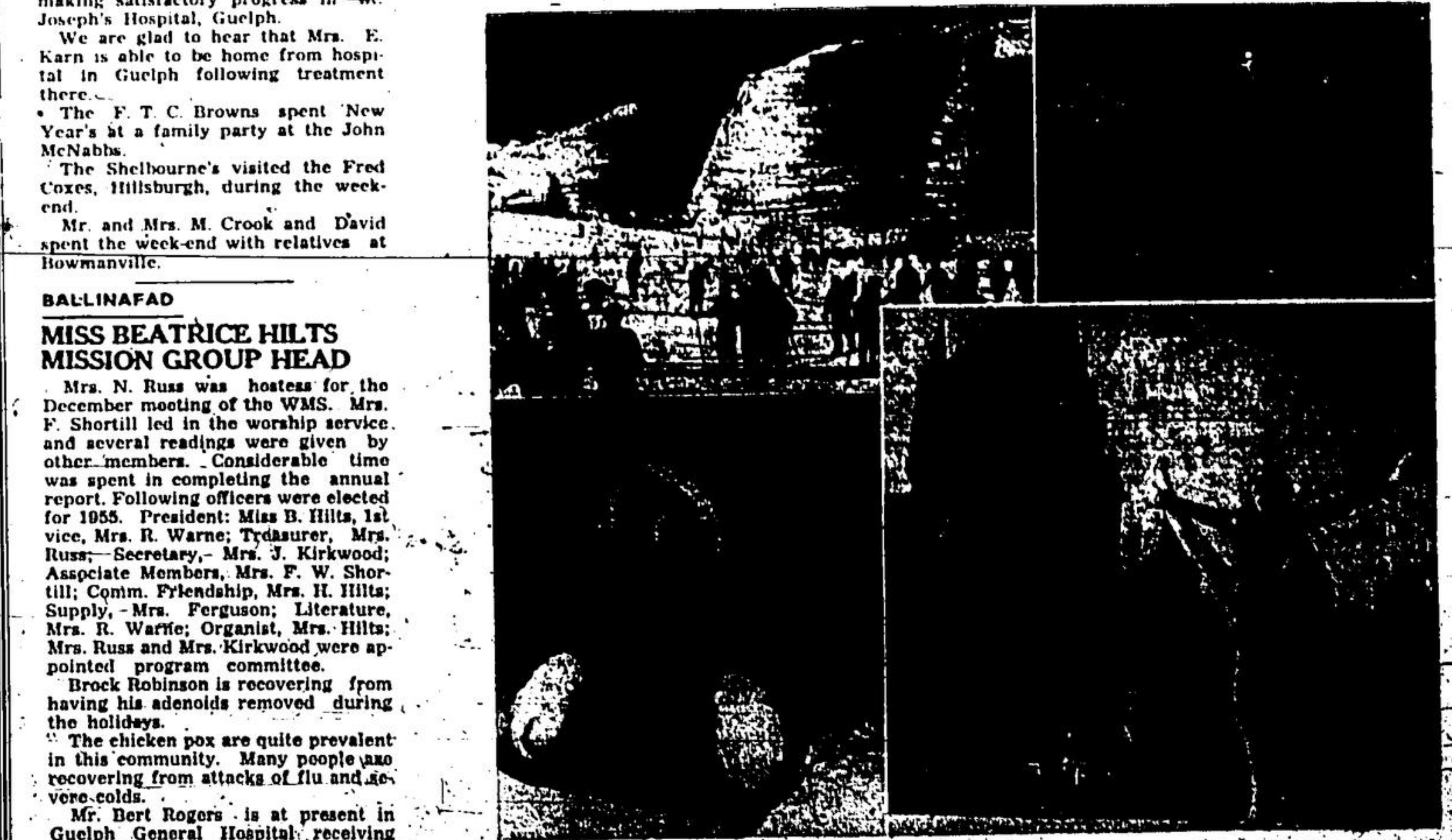
