Plan Physio-Therapy At Peel Memorial

Peel Memorial Hospital is soon to have a physio-therapy department where those in hospital and out patients may receive this type of treat-

For some months a joint committee of the Board of Governors and the Hospital's Medical Staff has been investigating this matter to determine the need, the space required and available for such a department at Peel Memorial, the cost of the necessary equipment and the expense of operating such a health service

At the last meeting of the Board of Governors, the Committee, headed by Mr. Walter Misener, recommended the setting up of such a department as soon as possible.

Mr. Misener in bringing in the recommendation explained that the three members of the Medical Staff on the committee, Doctors Eagleson, Garrioch and Ross, had reported unanimously in favour of such a service. It was their considered opinion that the department could be fitted into a small room in the basement of the new wing. The cost of the required alterations to the room and for the purchase of the necessary equipment, would be between \$700.00 and \$800.00.

While it was felt that it would take time to make the department cover its own cost, it was the considered opinion of the committee in which the of operation it would at least become another three months.
