History is Theme
As Institute Convenes
 History was the theme of Limehouse Women's Institute meeting on Thursday, when Miss Winnifred Ivens was hostess.
 Members recalled an historical incident which happened in the community since the W.I. was organized, as their roll call contribution. Mrs. S. Kirkpatrick convened the meeting, which included a paper by Mrs. A. Benton "With the Ladies After Christmas" and a New Year message from Nancy Adams, presented by Mrs. Ellerby. In her notes on historical research, Mrs. Kirkpatrick mentioned the growth of the community, and the fact that there are now two teachers in the school for the first time in many years.
 Mrs. Ellerby gave the motto: Our today's and yesterday's are the blocks on which we build. Reporting on agriculture and industry, Mrs. James Noble told of a disastrous bush fire in Australia in which 14,000 sheep perished.
 The flower and fruit report showed nine shut-ins remembered at Christmas. Mrs. James Noble will be in charge of the library for the next two

months, during the absence of Mrs. Mitchell. A bazaar report by Mrs. Frank Brown and money from Mrs. Wm. Mitchell from sale of Christmas cards showed total amount cleared \$175.
 The fall fair-and-bazaar-committees will remain the same this year. A new book will be obtained for the Tweedsmuir history and Mrs. Ellerby volunteered to keep it up to date. Ten dollars will be sent to a provincial project to equip 4 villages in Ceylon where it is hoped to set up home demonstration units, each equipped with electric range, sewing machine, cooking utensils, etc.
 A letter of thanks was sent to the W.A. for a cheque, which the hall board will use for purchasing new chairs. Members will raise \$500 total money by the April meeting.
 President Mrs. Ed Sanford was in charge of the meeting, which ended with serving of refreshments.
 Owing to the icy roads there was no school on Thursday. The High School bus did not come over the hills four of its trips either.
