**Review Eleven Years Arts, Crafts Activity**

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Arts and Crafts was held at the Library on Thursday.  
This meeting marked eleven years of growth and progress. The Arts and Crafts can trace its origin to a day in August, 1942, when a meeting was held at the home of Mrs. M. H. Moyer for the purpose of discussing and planning an Arts and Crafts Guild to promote handicrafts in the vicinity of Georgetown.  
Due to World War II the creative arts were shelved and by organizing such a guild it would stimulate the cultural interests of the community. Mrs. Moyer's guests on this eventful day were the late Mrs. Ann Lawson, Mrs. L. DeVries, the late Mrs. Paul Beer, Mrs. Gordon Cousins and Mrs. A. G. M. Bruyna.  
At subsequent meetings held during the summer the names of Mrs. D. W. Baxter, Georgetown, Mrs. Wesley Beatty, Mrs. Wesley Wolfe of Acton, were added.  
In September of that year Mrs. J. B. Milne and Mrs. Wallace Thompson joined the Arts and Crafts.  
Mrs. Moyer was the first president and Mrs. Bruyna the first secretary-treasurer. Thus an idea became a reality. Through the efforts of these ladies the Arts & Crafts has become widely known in the district and has reached a membership of fifty-five.  
At the meeting last Thursday, Mrs. J. Arnott Early occupied the chair while Mrs. H. J. Newman read her report and Mrs. Early presented the retiring president with a cup and saucer in appreciation of her efforts on behalf of the Arts and Crafts.

The fact has been mentioned before that there is an abundance of talent and ability in Georgetown and the surrounding district. Frequently we feel that we must go further afield to obtain culture that lies at our very doorstep. Miss Rosemary Jordan, librarian, with the permission of the Library Board was the instigator of an idea to acquaint people with the ability of local artists. On Thursday members of the Arts and Crafts spent an enjoyable time viewing the works of Mrs. A. Bruyna. Her water colours especially were the source of many favourable comments. Mrs. Bruyna, who has lived in this community for a number of years was a former illustrator in New York City for magazines and books, notably "Vanity Fair". In recent years, Mrs. Bruyna has continued to paint in her spare time and her friends treasure her handpainted greeting cards sent at Christmas time.  
Mrs. Bruyna's pictures will remain in the library for another few weeks and will then be replaced by paintings of another local artist.  
Mrs. L. J. Bell was hostess assisted by co-hostesses, Mrs. Alex Reader, Mrs. Tom Beer, Rosemary Jordan, Mrs. Keith Barber, Mrs. Leslie Clark. Tea was poured by Mrs. W. C. Reynolds. The hostess and her assistants were thanked for their hospitality by Mrs. W. Beatty.
