**Farm Forums Discuss
Bringing Up Families**

"Bringing up the farm family," another topic of interest and importance, was discussed in Farm Forum groups January 17th. All forums reported a good attendance and animated discussions.

The groups agreed that there is considerable difference in rural family life today and twenty five years ago. Some mentioned were: better facilities for travel, more freedom in recreation, better educational opportunities, more money to spend and lack of strict discipline as in former years. Some forums think there is not the same sociability among the neighbours — all parties are now held in public places rather than in homes.

Question 2 was concerned with important problems to be faced in bringing up farm families today. Many mentioned the task of keeping young people interested and contented. With farmers' incomes so low compared to that of many engaged in other industries, there is a tendency for young people to seek educational away from home.

Educational facilities are a big problem with lack of capable teachers. Cooperation in family living, sharing responsibility, discussing mutual problems together, and most important, attending church as a family group would help solve some of the problems in family life today. The community may help by interesting the young people in local activities, 4-H Clubs and church work.

Mr. Kennedy told how a local service club ties in with the provincial program and how money collected from the public is used.
