#### Farm Forums Discuss Bringing Up Familes

Question 2 was concerned with important problems to be faced in bringing up farm families today. Many mentioned the task of keeping young people interested and contented. With farmers' incomes so low compared, to that of many engaged in other industries, there is a tendency for young people to seek employment away from home.

Educational facilities are a big problem with lack of capable teach-

Cooperation in family living, sharing responsibility, discussing mutual problems together, and most important, attending church as a family group would help solve some of the problems in family life today The community may help by interesting the young people in local activities, 4-11 Clubs and church work.
