FARM NEWS

Soil, Crop Convention Hear OAC's Dr. Tossell

Perhaps the most popular farm convention held in Toronto at this season of the year is that of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association, which was held in conjunction with the "Orfeda" show in the Coliseum, Toronto, from Tuesday to Friday, last week. It would be impossible to reproduce or even touch on the highlights of this outstanding programme.

Dr. Tossell Speaks
We were particularly impressed with the practical address of Dr. W. E. Tossell, of Guelph, on "Grass and Legume Combinations To Meet The Needs of the Ontario Farmer." Prior to 1935 most farmers depended almost entirely on a mixture of Red Clover and Timothy, or Alfalfa, Red Clover and Timothy. However, in recent years the trend has been to the inclusion of more grasses. This procedure has resulted in increased yields of hay and pasture per acre. Now that we have had more experience with these mixtures and in particular with the various grasses under different conditions and in various combinations, the tendency is to simplify the various seed mixtures. While the additional grasses do improve the mixture from a pasture standpoint, on the other hand they do in many cases lower the percentage of legumes in the hay. Personally, we feel that we would be wise to step up a bit the amount of Alfalfa seed we have been sowing in our mixtures. It was very evident last summer in the drought period that Alfalfa really pays off. In so far as we could determine, the only farmers who had green pasture were those who had been sowing a fair percentage of Alfalfa. We were therefore glad to note that Dr. Tossell and other forage crop workers have stepped up the amount of Alfalfa in their hay and pasture mixtures.

Alfalfa, Red Clover Scarce
Perhaps this is a bad year to talk about increasing the amount of Alfalfa seed in your seed mixtures next spring. Certainly with money in shorter supply and with Alfalfa and Red Clover selling at greatly increased prices, a lot of farmers will be doing a bit of thinking. This may be a good time to remember that old proverb, "a penny wise and a pound foolish." We should not forget that hay and pasture are our most valuable crops in this area. The quality and quantity of our hay and pasture crops play a very important part as to whether or not our dairy cattle pay off. In short they are important factors in the cost of producing milk. For these reasons we would definitely go along with Dr. Tossell and other drainage conditions are satisfactory, recommend for hay and pasture seedings this coming spring the following mixture per acre:

Alfalfa, 7 lbs.; Red Clover 3 lbs.; Bromo 5 lbs.; and Timothy 2 lbs.
Whether or not 2 or 3 lbs. of Orchard Grass are added to this mixture would depend on whether or not the farm operator is using grass silage. Orchard Grass is our most productive grass but it does take a good deal more management. In our opinion a farm operator who includes Orchard Grass in his mixtures must be prepared to practice clipping his pastures. In brief if the orchard grass is allowed to get over two or three inches high, our dairy cattle are not very fond of it.
By the way, a new circular on Hay and Pasture Mixtures is just off the press and can be secured at the Agricultural Office in Milton.

FARM NEWS

Dr. Beer Contributes To Spanish Bull Shipment

A shipment of eight bulls left Canada for Spain last month. These were not fighting bulls for the ring, but richly bred Holstein sires designed to improve the quality of Spanish dairy cows. The bulls were purchased by the Ministry of Agriculture at Madrid for use in the artificial breeding units of that country. Brothers of these bulls are amongst the top sires in leading Canadian artificial breeding units.

Also included in the plane load of Holsteins were four bulls and a heifer calf for the herd of Count Marzotto, near Venice, Italy. This is the largest herd of Canadian bred Holsteins in the world, numbering close to 1000 head. The entire group of animals were blue bloods, having been selected from amongst the top herds in Canada. Contributing to the Spanish shipment were: J. J. E. McCague, Alliston, Sheffield Farms, St. George; George W. Dennis and Sons, St. Thomas; Amos Jantzi, Wellfleet; Dr. Paul Beer, Georgetown; and Raymondale Farm, Vaudreuil, Quebec. The Venice-bound group consisted of a heifer calf from H. I. Guilbert, Vercheres, Que., and bulls from Dr. Hector I. Astengo, Brantford; J. J. E. McCague, Alliston; N. W. McCenkey, Peterboro; and George W. Dennis, St. Thomas.

Spanish interest in Canadian Holsteins was stimulated by the visit of G. M. Clemens, secretary of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada to that country last summer. Accompanying the cattle as herdsman for the ocean flight was Michael Motion of Oakville. Although his father was a former Squadron Leader in the RAF, this was Mike's first flight. The round trip would cover some 25,000 miles as the plane would go on from Spain and Italy to India to pick up a load of monkeys to be brought back to the USA.

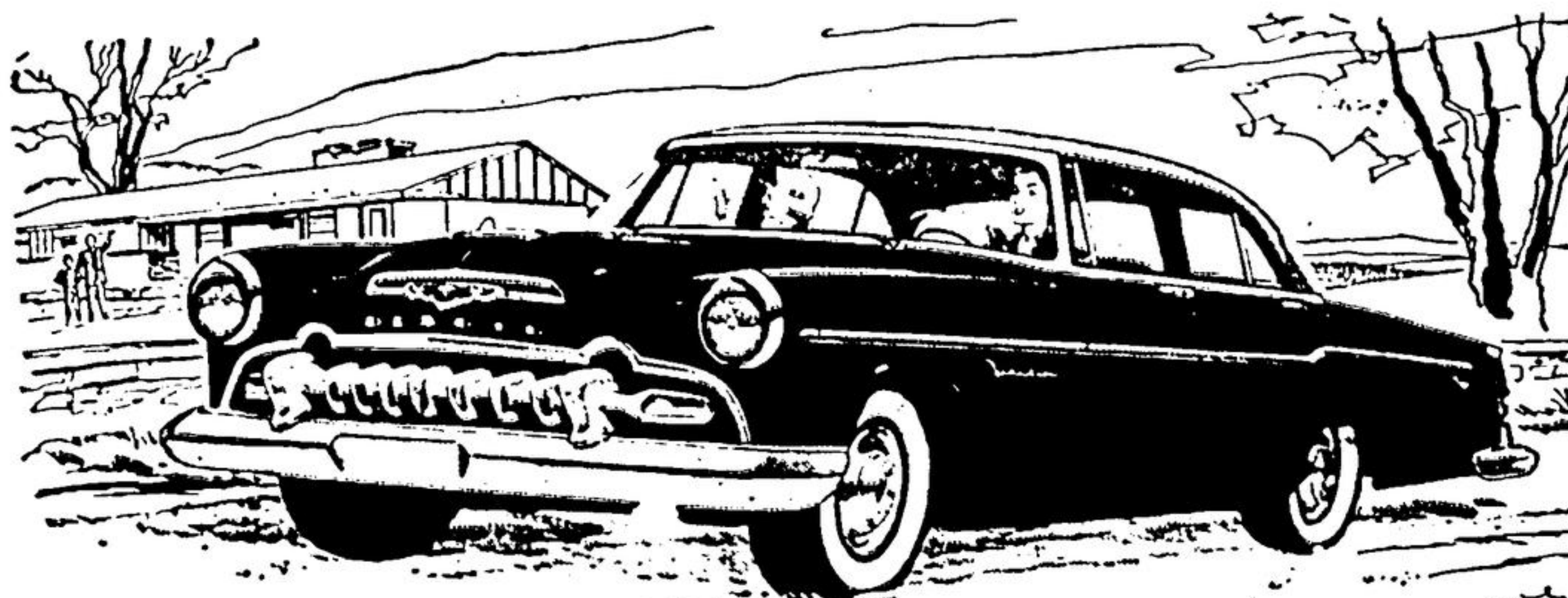
Grand Union Gets 3 Advertising Awards
