PEEL HOSPITAL "BABY" SENDS \$18.00 PRESENT

With just three weeks to go until February 22nd, the date of the Peel Memorial Hospital's Annual Meeting and the close of the Special Campaign, the prospects for achieving both objectives are mighty pleasing according to C. V. Charters the committee chairman. As of Monday, the last day of January, the membership stood at 220 against the set goal of 250 and unless all signs fail the additional 30 members and more will be enrolled before the dead line. The end of January saw the total of donations to the Equipment Fund over \$2100, which means that \$400 is still required if the campaign objective of \$2500 is to be reached. Basing their estimate on the results of the past month, the committee is quite optimistic and confident that the \$2500 mark will be passed. The final week of last month was a most encouraging one with over \$300 added to the Equipment Fund and in the same period 14 new members joined the association. Mrs. Rachel Stork Algie, a former Bramptonian, now residing in Montreal, sent a nice letter along with a cheque for \$18 pointing out that their daughter, Jane, was born in Peel Memorial Hospital eighteen years ago (January 27th, 1937), and the contribution enclosed was considered a suitable way to mark that anniversary. There's a practical tip for all other parents of children born in Peel Memorial since its opening thirty years ago. Or what about some of those "babies" themselves now grown to young manhood and womanhood, making a thank-offering in support of the institution which brought them into the world? What could be more suitable than this method of observing Health week. Another substantial boost to the campaign this past week was the \$50 donation of the Peel Garage Operators Association. President Emerson McKinney and secretary F. E. Loney, were justly proud to visit the Hospital on Monday morning and present this cheque to the Administrator, Miss Hilditch, on behalf of the Garage Operators of the town and county.
