The Grand Union Company, according to an announcement-made by Lansing P. Shield, president, has completed negotiations for the acquisition of the Food Fair Super Markets of Washington, D.C., which are owned by the Square Deal Market Company, Inc.

The Washington company operates a chain of modern super markets in the District of Columbia, adjoining counties in Maryland and the State of Virginia. Sales of this organization were reported as \$18,283,666 for the fiscal year ended August 28, 1954.

The acquisition of the Food Fair Super Markets - marks 'the entry of The Grand Union Company into the greater Washington area which it con siders one of the fastest growing population centres in the entire coun--try. This area recently has developed at a rate in excess of most metropolitan areas and has grown approximately 40 per cent since 1940.

Present expansion plans, for this Washington operation call for six additional super markets to be opened within the current year. The affiliation of these Food Fair Super Markets with Grand Union will make possible a broad expansion programme to keep pace with the tremendous growth of the Washington metropolitan area, particularly in the suburbs.
