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Baptist Leader in India Speaks Here Next Week



On Tuesday evening at 8:00 p.m. February 15th, the Rev. C. Devasahayam of Avangadla, South India, will address a meeting in First Baptist Church under the auspices of the Guelph Association of Baptist Churches.

Mr. Devasahayam is a university graduate in science. Later he entered the famous Serampore College founded by William Carey and received his B.D. degree. For the past eight years he has assumed the same responsibilities of the Avangadla field of the Canadian Baptist Mission in South India as one of our Canadian missionaries. In 1947 when the full responsibilities of the Mission's work were placed in the hands of the native church Mr. Devasahayam became its first general secretary. He is in Canada to do deputation work for advanced study under the John McLaughlin Scholarship Fund. His father is the principal of the Canadian Baptist Seminary at Kakinada, South India. The meeting is open to the public and it is hoped that all will take this as a general invitation.



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Court Upholds By-law IGA Appeals Decision

Bob Caldwell and Bruce Williamson, proprietors of the Georgetown IGA store, will appeal a court decision which quashed their attempt to break the local store closing by-law.

Magistrate Hollinrake, who heard the case at Willowdale in January, handed down his decision last Wednesday.

The IGA owners had been charged by the local provincial police with infractions of By-Law 427, by opening their store each Thursday afternoon, contrary to the by-law which provides that stores must close that day.

The case, first brought up in Georgetown court in December, was adjourned to another court because Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon had acted for the town originally in drawing up the by-law in 1942.

The charge was laid by Cpl. Ray Beckett who purchased merchandise in the store on a Thursday afternoon. The IGA owners, represented by Toronto lawyer C. C. Downey admitted that their store had been open and advertised as such in the Herald, but questioned the validity of the by-law as their defence. John Ord of the Hewson & Ord law firm represented the town and town clerk John D. Kelly was called as a witness.

Magistrate Hollinrake, in his decision, said that he hesitated after a 12-year period to expect the town to produce the original petition of merchants which asked council to draw up the by-law. The petition, according to Mr. Kelly's evidence, was not available in the town files.

The defence attorney claimed that this petition should be scrutinized but the magistrate said it could not be inferred that the petition was not regular, said that he would assume there must have been a petition in order for the council of that day to pass the by-law in the first place.

Mr. Caldwell and Mr. Williamson were each fined \$25 including costs, or the option of five days in jail.

The IGA proprietors, meanwhile, are advertising their store as open all day Thursdays and closed Monday days as they have been doing since last fall.

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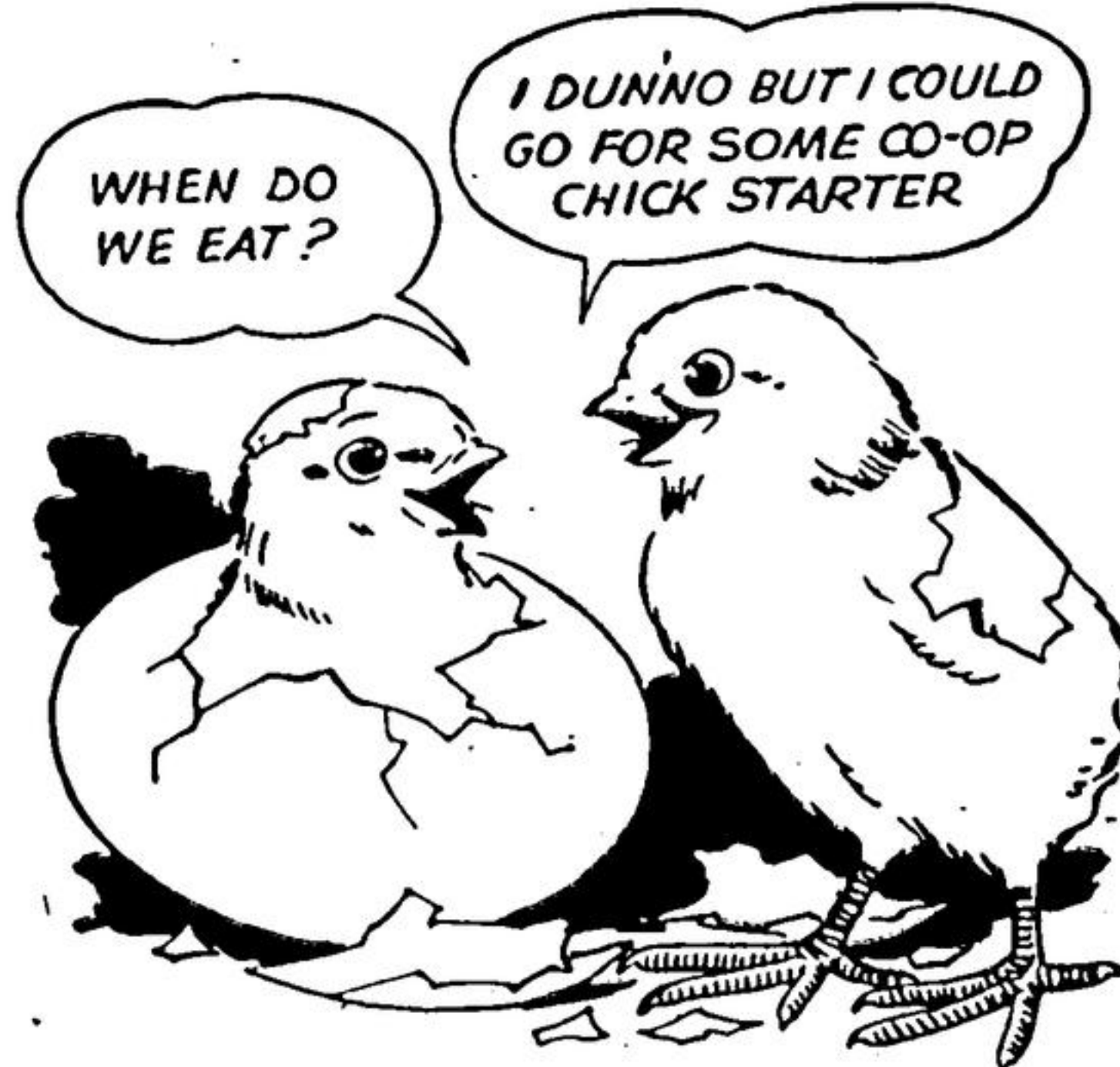
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- Start the brooder at least two days before the chicks arrive and be sure all other equipment is in good working order.
- Have the proper feed on hand: (a) Chick scratch grain should be fed for the first 24 hours along with insoluble chick size grit if the birds have travelled far and appear hungry. (b) If the chicks are not too hungry on arrival, they can be started right on Co-op Chick Starter with grit sprinkled on the feed the first day and twice weekly thereafter. (c) Water should be clean, fresh and plentiful. Have at least two 1-gal. waterers for each 100 chicks. (d) Do not feed scratch grain with Co-op Chick Starter till the birds are 7 weeks old — this program gives the most efficient gains.
- Arrange the feeders and waterers like spokes in a wheel around the hover. Allow at least 1" of hopper space per chick to start.
