The funeral service for the late Mary Louise Stockford was held in the McIntyre and Wilkie funeral home, Guelph, last Friday.

Rev. David Paton officiated. Interment was in the family plot, in Woodlawn Cemetery.

The pallbearers were three nephews-in-law, Sidney Copp, Toronto, Thomas Watts, Downsview and Jack Rush, Toronto, and four nephews, Charles Stockford, Downsview, Elmer Stockford, St. Catharines and Victor and Jack Stockford, Guelph.

Mary Louise Stockford, daughter of the late Charles Stockford and Sarah Wood was born in Guelph and received her early education in Guelph Public School and Business College.

During her early life she was a member of the Congregational Church, later joining Chalmers United Church.

As her father was chairman of the group at the Congregational Church, interested in developing a Mission Sunday School, in the Brooklyn district, Louise became one of its early teachers and for more than forty years continued in devoted service. During that period Brooklyn Sunday School was held in three different buildings before moving to the present modern church school for which she was chosen treasurer of the building fund.

Miss Stockford's business experience began in the office of George B Morris Hardware. Following the transfer of that business she became bookkeeper for the Bond Hardware Company. She later joined the staff of the Homewood Sanitarium as an accountant, which position she held for almost twenty years and until retirement.

Miss Stockford acted as treasurer for the YWCA when that group functioned from the Blue Triangle on St. George's Square.

For some years she was an active member of the Business and Professional Women's Club and retained an interest in all forms of social welfare effort. She was a member of the Guelph Horticultural Society for many years and took a keen interest in the beautification of the city.

She leaves to mourn her loss two sisters, Nellie and Emily, residing at the family home, 472 Woodlawn Street and two brothers, John and Arthur of Guelph. Two brothers, Charles William and Henry (Harry) predeceased her.

The only bull is a March, 1954 son of Abegweit Limestone, with three nearest dams averaging 21,616 - 888 - 411 per cent, his own dam having 22,837 - 801 - 3,515 and four 20,000 lb. records. The oldest female was born in 1949, and includes one or more daughters by the following sires: Montvic Rag Apple Duke (XXX); Elmeroff Sylvio-Gran (XXX); Lonelm Rag Apple Hamadan; Lonelm Rag Apple Ivan; Bond Haven Sovereign Prince; Eglington Emperor Supreme, etc. Several of the females selling have high records - one with 22,063 - 751 - 411 per cent, another with 19,807 - 678; still another with over 20,000 lbs. not yet reported.

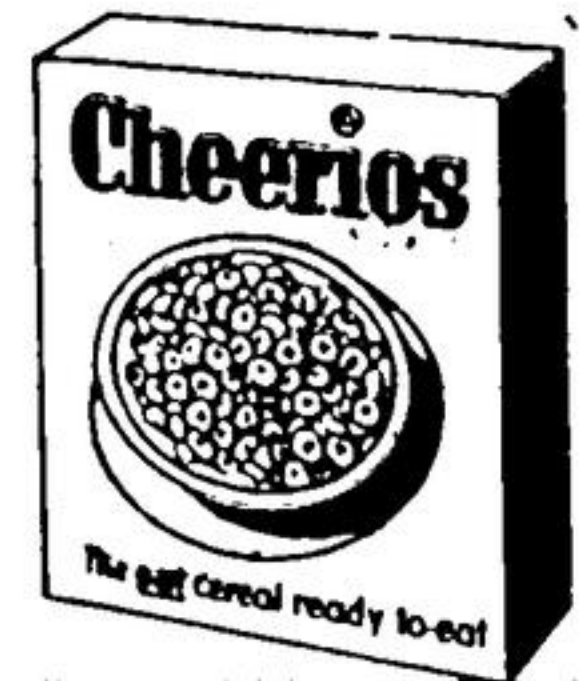
